Minister's Notes Our Treasure

"Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

I know that some of you reading this have a visceral reaction to biblical quotes, but you have to admit that Jesus is credited with saying some pretty profound things.

In this particular case the quote implies that we value the most those things that speak to our emotions and our passions... those things that we love. Treasure in this context is the thing that we value beyond our material possessions, beyond the things that moths and rust consume and thieves can steal.

For many of you reading these words, the Universalist Unitarian Church of Halifax is such a treasure. We have a deep emotional attachment to this institution. This is where we find many of our friends. This is where we regularly congregate to consider our highest values. This is where we volunteer our time, where we come to ensure that we are individually supported spiritually and emotionally and where we ensure that members of our community are taken care of.

UUCH is a place of integrity. It is a place where we can truly be ourselves, where we can express our doubts and our concerns and get a sympathetic hearing from others who are struggling to give meaning to their lives in this incredible time in which we live.

UUCH is a treasure that has existed through good times and bad since 1837 because of people like you who find their treasure in our beloved community.

The continuity of this institution, like all such organizations depends on the support needed to make the institution flourish, while demonstrating careful stewardship of its resources, be they volunteer time, investment in building and equipment or financial assets. The continuity of this institution depends on the commitment shown by its friends, its members, its leaders and its staff.

I can attest to the conscientious effort made by your board and your staff. In the past year we have saved \$5,000 in fuel costs, while reducing our Green House Gas (CO2) emissions by some 30,000 kg. thanks to the decision to install our new high efficiency gas furnace, and the gifts that made that possible. The Board also saved us over \$1,000 by purchasing rather than renting our photocopier. The careful stewardship of our Board, and the management of building maintenance issues using volunteer time have saved us untold thousands of dollars. There is nothing in our budget that does not get careful scrutiny.

75% of our income comes from pledges received from members and friends. 15% comes from rental income and 7% comes from fundraising, (another example of the commitment of our congregation).

It is always a difficult challenge to match our budget presented at the Semi-annual Meeting with the money raised during our November-December pledge drive. Last year there was a gap of \$12,000 between the two figures. We managed to "Close the Gap" with a special appeal, thanks to the generosity of many members who increased their pledge.

This year the Board has decided that we will not have a special appeal following the pledge drive. If our pledge drive falls short of the budgeted \$120,000, then the Board will cut the budget further and this may include cuts to employee salaries.

For this reason, it is imperative that you consider your pledge carefully this year. This is a one-time-only appeal.

Today we are a healthy vibrant congregation enjoying a beautiful if somewhat creaky old building in downtown Halifax. We enjoy this amazing institution because others before us have treasured it and have preserved it and have supported it. Now once again, we get to do our part to keep the flame of Unitarian Universalism alive in Halifax.

Themed Church and Small Group Ministry.....

I am very interested in working with members of the congregation who would like to extend our implementation of "Themed Church" to include "Small Group Ministry." It probably would help if I explained those terms.

Themed Church is a process involving the establishment of monthly themes for the activities of the church. Our themes this year have been "Promise" in September, "Grace" in October and "Integrity" in November. I am working with a group of ministers in Canada and the USA with a goal to synchronizing our themes so that we can share materials and enter into dialogue.

We have implemented this at UUCH to the extent that our Sunday Services and sermons relate to a theme each month, our Wayside Pulpit proclaims the theme, and we publish in hard copy and online a "magazine" providing readings, quotations and web links to material that can provide a deeper exploration of the theme. Members and friends of UUCH are invited to contribute material that could be incorporated into the Sunday services or the magazine.

Small Group Ministry is based on intentional small groups that provide a level of personal connection between individuals, that goes beyond what we can do at Sunday Service. "Small" means a group with a maximum of 8-10 people. Groups of this size provide an opportunity to relate on a more intentional level. "Group" is a gathering of individuals, sometimes selected at random, sometimes selected for a specific interest or characteristic. These groups meet over a period of time, typically once per month. "Ministry" is the process or act of caring or being present with another. This relates to the spiritual as well as the physical and emotional well-being of the group participants.



I am now inviting you to consider joining our first Small Group Ministry team or teams. We will meet at a time and location that is convenient for the participants in an atmosphere that is relaxed and comfortable. We will explore our personal responses to the questions raised by the themes and the material provided as a way to deepen our connection with each other and with our UU faith tradition.

As your minister I will lead the first Small Group Ministry meetings, and depending how the process grows we may train lay members of the congregation to lead spin-off groups.

If you would like to be a member of one of our first Small Group Ministry Teams, please contact me directly by phone or email. Our ability to implement this proven concept will depend on your response.

UUCH Refugee Sponsorship Update

As announced in the October newsletter, the Social Responsibility Committee held an information meeting on Sunday October 4th to explain the refugee sponsorship process and what is needed for our church to take on such a project.

About 25 people attended and sixteen filled out forms to pledge either volunteer time or financial support (over \$7,000).

Ten individuals came forward to form a committee to take us to the next steps: board approval, CUC support, and congregational approval. It was a very successful meeting—and the lunch fundraiser preceding it raised our first cash, \$258.60!

On October 25th the congregation gathered at the Semi-annual General Meeting voted unanimously on a motion resolving that UUCH sponsor refugees, as many as available funds permit, preferably a family. The motion also mandated that the UUCH Refugee Sponsorship Committee be authorized to manage the process and the fundraising, select the refugees, and work with other groups as appropriate.

The committee has already learned of possible refugees to sponsor, and is in touch with the other Maritime UU congregations about their getting involved with our project. Because the CUC is a government-approved sponsor, known as a Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH), we will be a Constituent Group working with them. They have already provided us with financial guidelines and an appropriately-worded board motion to comply with CRA regulations. They are ready to help us at every step.

Because it is a great advantage to any group wanting to sponsor refugees to work with an SAH, and there are only 6 in Nova Scotia, we added a fourth line to the motion, resolving to assist other groups in non-financial ways if needed, to facilitate refugee sponsorship in Atlantic Canada. The CUC is willing to act as SAH to non-UU groups and this could be another way we can help with the Syrian refugee crisis.



Many members of the Social Responsibility Committee are involved with the Refugee Sponsorship Committee but it will be separate, reporting directly to the board, as it is such a major volunteer and financial commitment. Andy Blair and I are the co-chairs, Kathy Spencer is the Treasurer,

and Wietske Gradstein is Secretary. Other members are Barbara Harsanyi, Marilyn Shinyei, Molly Hurd, Sylvia Mattinson, Colleen Ashworth and Leela Pendse Shaw.

Thank you everyone for your support so far. You will be hearing more from us soon!


We are pleased to report that **Jim Morrison** is recuperating well from surgery.

UNITARIEN DU CANADA

From your CUC Board of Trustees

The Board met face-face for a late September fourday productive and invigorating meeting with amazing individuals from across this country who are committed to the vitality and resilience of our UU faith community.

More interesting highlights to all of you might be the revised draft Vision Statement for Canadian Unitarian Universalists (and Universalist Unitarians) incorporating feedback from many UU congregations and communities. It will be further tested by targeted focus groups this fall, and the result brought to the 2016 AGM for ratification.

The Youth Observer on the Board was animated about the Board's support for youth networking across the country, and will be attending two of the regional fall gatherings in BC and Fredericton.

The Board reviewed and passed motions on two political action proposals. The action items were in regard to asking all political parties to consider modifying CRA regulations to strengthen the right of charities to advocate on social policy matters. The Board supported what it believed to be a conservative motion on this subject with a view to minimizing risk to the CUC while it is being audited. More detail on the proposed legislative change is located here: http://protectcanadiancharities.ca/#home.

(After the May CRA visit there have been minor further CRA requests but no outcome to date, and no timelines indicated).

In addition, the role of CUC in Partner Church Arrangements was clarified. Under CRA regulations, financial gifts from charities to qualified donees (including partner churches) must be monitored and controlled by the donor. The CUC cannot perform this role on behalf of its members: the monitoring responsibility falls to the individual Canadian partner church donor.

We had an energizing half-day with Erin Roberts of ZZeem Inc. - Helping Build Successful Service Organizations at: http://tiny.cc/eysahw. We focused on how we effectively articulate CUC's Value to Member Congregations. To that end we developed a Member Value Proposition statement which we hope will activate that necessary healthy connection between CUC, a "not for profit" organization, and its member congregations.

There are two other significant communication pieces for your action.

If you haven't already, the first is to sign up for CUC'S eNews, printed six times a year starting in February. Just go to cuc.ca under communications then eNews. Back issues are a great source of info on exciting events and topics.

The second for presidents, and possibly other interested leaders, is to change to a generic email address, for example *uuchpresident@....* That way no president will be missing from the all important leaders list, especially after transitions at AGMs. The same could apply to delegates if we can name them early in the church year.

The Board so much values our face-to-face meetings but until May we will meet the fourth Monday of each month using Zoom video conferencing.

Religious Exploration



Here's an overview of the RE activities from October. The monthly theme in the services was "Grace" which I brought into the RE lessons, intended to help families continue their own discussions at home. I've been updating the RE bulletin board with a memento of each Sunday's activities. Please have a look, and ask any of the children to discuss their work with you. I'm sure they'd be happy to.

Oct 4th: Stellaluna. During Children of all Ages, Wynne Jordan read the book, Stellaluna - a lovely story about a mother bat who, flying through the night with her baby Stellaluna clutched to her breast, was attacked by an owl. Stellaluna fell from the her mother's safety, fortunately landing in a nest full of baby birds. Lots of fun ensued—mostly over confusion about trying to live like a bird or a bat. In the end, Stellaluna was reunited with her mother, and everyone lived happily ever after.

Upstairs, the younger children retold the story, made a large, bat-shaped "story map," had a great discussion, and decided that the moral of the story was: *It doesn't matter if we're the same or different--we can still be friends*. Tracy Boyer took the older girls into the Fahs Room, where they discussed their personal areas of interest and skill, and how they might be incorporated into the RE programme. This was very helpful, and will influence future planning. Thank you.

Oct 11th: *Imagine Grace.* During *Children of all Ages*, I tied the theme of *Grace* to John Lennon's birthday and Thanksgiving Day, both this weekend. I presented Lennon's song

Imagine on video, and made connections between *Imagine*, giving and receiving grace, Thanksgiving, and saying grace.

Because of the maturity and confidence of the children present, we were able to discuss some pretty deep things in RE. Lennon's *Imagine* asks us to imagine a more beautiful world—as well as to consider some more provocative themes. We talked about peace, pain, hunger, need, acts of grace, and the existence of heaven, hell and God. We then planted young aloe vera plants to take home, because nurturing a living thing is also an act of grace. Thank you, Martha Wilson and Louise Malloch for participating fully; your input was invaluable.

Oct 18th: UN Sunday. Avard Woolaver presented the story for Children of all Ages. He spoke about his family's involvement with UN agencies in various capacities over the years, including of course, his daughter Jane, who is our very own UUCH UNO youth representative. Thank you.


In RE, we talked about families helping others—even complete strangers—as an act of grace. We read the true story of *Grace Darling*, the teenage daughter of a lighthouse keeper, who pleaded with and finally convinced her father to row with her into a storm to save a group of shipwrecked sailors. We had an excellent discussion, then made a beautiful collage depicting this heroic act of bravery and grace.

Oct 25th: These Hands. Sunday's sermon dealt with grace, as in elegance and beauty of form. The Rev. Norm and I presented These Hands during Children of all Ages. The text is taken verbatim from the song of the same name, co-written by Dave Gunning and George Canyon. It talks about many of the wonderful things people have chosen to do with their hands, then asks: What shall I do with these hands of mine? Afterwards, we were treated to a performance of the song by the After Choir. Thanks so much.
