2023 CUC AGM and Symposium Pam Griffin-Hody



The CUC AGM took place on Friday, May 19, with numerous delegates joining on Zoom and about 100 attending in person in Ottawa as well. Kath Anthony and I

represented UUCH in person as did Rev. Buffardi.

One concerning note in the report from the Executive Director is the declining numbers across the country—a decline of 13% overall. This not only affects our faith, our movement; but leads to a smaller budget for the CUC since the membership levies are decreasing at a faster rate than direct personal donations to the CUC. Because congregations are feeling this as well, there is no plan to change the membership fee structure currently.

You will recall that we held a Town Hall/General Special Meeting on March 5 to discuss the proposed motions for the AGM. There was a by-law amendment, the 2023/24 CUC Goals and Strategic Priorities, and a motion to repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery. UUCH readers saw little of concern in either the by-law amendment or the Strategic Priorities. We discussed the Doctrine of Discovery, and a motion was put forth by Irene Baros-Johnson that UUCH formally repudiate the Doctrine of Discovery and UUCH voted unanimously to do so.

On March 30 the Roman Catholic Church rescinded the Doctrine of Discovery, so changes needed to be made to the resolution.

The final resolution, marked to show the changes, is as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED that:

- The Canadian Unitarian Council and its membercongregations formally repudiates the Doctrine of Discovery, and urges its member congregations to do the same;
- 2. The decision be communicated to the Canadian-Ministers of Crown-Indigenous Relations and-Northern Affairs (CIRNAC) and Indigenous-Services Canada (ISC), the Catholic Church in-Canada, Indigenous organizations, and others asnecessary; The CUC will add our name to the list of faith organizations who have already repudiated the Doctrine of Discovery, and this will be communicated to the member congregations;

3. The CUC advocates for legislation to formally enact the repudiation of the Doctrine nationally and within Canadian legal systems;

An Action Group be set up immediately to plan the implementation of this repudiation.

The CUC will implement a way for congregations to add their names.

The Goals and Strategic Priorities document was found wanting by many members; most importantly, to black UUs who expressed that they were harmed by the lack of specific language dealing with anti-black racism. After much debate (with time extended), it was decided to send the document back to the CUC Board for revision. It was the collective feeling of those assembled that when someone of any group explains that something is hurtful or harmful, it is our job to step back, listen, and repair. The revised document will be circulated when it is ready.

The 2023 Symposium theme was about living into the 8th principle. The Confluence Lecture by Rev. Julie Stonenberg is available on YouTube and I highly recommend it. The keynote speaker on Saturday morning, Albert Dumont, an Algonquin elder, shared his life experiences and hopes for a better future. The materials from the workshop streams will be shared, initially with the Reconciliation Healing & Dismantling Racism Team for processing and prioritizing what actions can be taken by UUCH as a collective.

I also learned that there is an online CUC youth group! Perhaps our RE leaders can get the information, and our youth 13/14 to 17/18 can meet their UU peers there. About 40 youth were taking part in CANUUDLE, the annual youth conference, and we saw them several times over the weekend. CHORUS, the CUC group for young adults (to age 35), was holding some concurrent events.

Besides the formality of speakers and workshops, there were several social activities and many conversations with UUs from coast (ours!) to coast. It was time well spent and I am grateful I was able to attend in person.

Halifax, where the 2020 Conference was to be held, passed the soil from 2018 in Hamilton to Ottawa where it was mixed with Ottawa soil (from the meditation garden at Ottawa First) at the sacred soil ceremony during the opening on Friday. It is unknown whose soil these will mingle with in 2025.

Summer Reading List

We are surrounded by bad news about the climate, and the crisis seems to be getting closer and worse. We were glad some of you took the opportunity at our service in April to share your concerns about the situation, and we plan to follow up with more such opportunities in the fall. In the meantime there are several books that deal with a more positive view of the future, eventually.

The first that I would mention is fiction, but I thought it quite realistic: *The Ministry for the Future* by Kim Stanley Robinson. Many pages, but an intelligent analysis of the way things could be.

A reporter's viewpoint is taken by Chris Turner, an Alberta writer whose new book, *How to be a Climate Optimist: Blueprints for a Better World,* has just won the Shaughnessy Cohen Prize for Political Writing. He writes this time of global efforts already working to save the planet, and describes a twenty-first century quality of life far superior in every way to the version we currently have. I am already on the list for this from our local library.

Or for a more philosophical look at the situation, try *An Inconvenient Apocalypse: Environmental Collapse, Climate Crisis, and the Fate of Humanity* by Wes Jackson and Robert Jensen. Written by two of today's most prominent writers in the fields of sustainability studies, this book confronts harsh ecological realities, explores the roots of social injustice and offers a downpowering path to "fewer and less". To quote the publisher "the authors offer a secular reading of theological concepts—the prophetic, the apocalyptic, a saving remnant, and grace—to chart a collective path for dealing with today's multiple cascading ecological crises." A theological perspective may be what we all need to manage the years ahead. It also is available from the Halifax Library, and I am on the waiting list for this one too.

We are fortunate to live in a part of the world where we can still anticipate a warm, comfortable summer. Get out and enjoy it, and take a book with you!

UUCH SAH News

The state of the world seems particularly grim these days, so let me start with good news.

Clement, Sophie, and their two boys, the Rwandan Unitarians we have told you about before, have just had their interview in their country of asylum and will proceed to do their biometrics (i.e. fingerprinting and security check) next week. Their medical will soon follow giving us great hope of seeing them here in July or August.

And Khaled, a young Afghan man who arrived in Sept 2021 has just received the \$6,000 Sobeys Award to continue his studies at NSCC.

We started 2023 with a backlog of 187 people for whom we applied in 2018, 19, 20 & 21, and we were really expecting to see huge numbers of those refugees arriving this year. To date we have had 53 people arrive.

Will we still see 100 more by year's end along with the 65 or so Afghans who have been promised to be expedited.



Here I am with Mehdi, an Iranian man, who arrived from Turkey on April 14th.

Finding housing for so many newcomers is very difficult these days. Happily, that doesn't fall to the UUCH SAH.

Our role is to accept candidates for our waiting list, submit applications for them to IRCC and monitor their well-being after they arrive. A settlement group, which may be family or may be an established refugee sponsorship group does the hard work of raising money for their first year in Canada, finding them accommodation and supporting them in every way through that first year.

Our SAH team (nine people including five UUCH members) is making great progress this year towards our dual goals of sustainability and succession planning. We are having some fun along the way such as our Afghan potluck in May with 60 people in attendance. Or showing up at the airport for an arrival—always a happy day!

Stay tuned for a barbecue in late summer or fall.
