#### Future projects:

# **February is CUC Month**

CUC Month is held every year in February. One of the CUC's activities during this month is to post a daily CUC fact on the CUC Facebook page. Let's look for those; we could learn something we never knew!

The Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC) is the national organization for Canadian Unitarians, Unitarian Universalists, and Universalist Unitarians (UUs) in Canada. The CUC is made up of member congregations to which it is accountable. It is a voice for our vibrant, liberal faith community, within the interfaith community in Canada, and within the international UU community. The CUC, through its small but dedicated <a href="staff">staff</a>, provides support for UUs and congregations across the country, fostering growth and outreach, particularly in the areas of lifespan religious education, spiritual growth, and social responsibility.

The CUC's Social Justice Team has an overarching role in Canadian UU social justice work. It is responsible for identifying social justice issues to be acted on, recommending action plans and initiatives, and helping connect congregations and individuals to each other.

The CUC <u>board of trustees</u> is elected by delegates from member congregations at the <u>Annual General Meeting</u>, hosted by a Canadian congregation each year.

This year's AGM will be on May 26th.

# **CUC Resolutions for CUC AGM, May 2024**

There are two resolutions from congregations for the upcoming CUC AGM, one regarding fossil fuels and one with a language update to the 2023 resolutions on the Doctrine of Discovery.

#### From Vancouver Unitarians:

RESOLVED that the CUC and member congregations:

- 1. Be in solidarity with those Indigenous Peoples who oppose fossil fuel extraction and infrastructure on their traditional territories; and
- 2. Oppose individual and bank investment in fossil fuel extraction, refining, transportation, and marketing leading to fossil fuel consumption and Global Heating; and
- 3. Who bank at the five major Canadian banks are encouraged to move their financial business elsewhere; and
- 4. Similarly encourage all holding mutual funds and other investment vehicles with significant investments in 1) fossil fuel corporations, or 2) in the five major Canadian banks which fund them, to move their investments to financial instruments with lower or no investments in 1) fossil fuel corporations, and 2) the five major Canadian banks; and
- 5. Encourage boards of trustees to consider communicating this resolution to elected officials, Indigenous Peoples, and journalists, as well as financial, environmental, IBPOC, social justice, and faith groups in their geographic location(s).

#### From Toronto First:

#### BE IT RESOLVED that:

- 1. Regarding the Repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery motion passed at the 2023 CUC Annual Meeting:
- i. The words "and the doctrine of *Terra Nullius*" be appended to the phrase "the Doctrine of Discovery" (or "the Doctrine", as the case may be); and
- ii. The remainder of the resolution be amended to reflect that it now refers to two doctrines instead of one; such that the amended resolution reads:
  - 1. The Canadian Unitarian Council formally repudiates the Doctrine of Discovery and the doctrine of Terra Nullius, and urges its member congregations to do the same;
  - 2. The CUC will add our name to the list of faith organizations who have already repudiated the Doctrine of Discovery and the doctrine of Terra Nullius, and this will be communicated to the member congregations;
  - 3. The CUC advocates for legislation to formally enact the repudiation of <u>both doctrines</u> nationally and within Canadian legal systems;
  - 4. An Action Group be set up immediately to plan the implementation of these repudiations.
- 2. The **Action Plan** proposed at the same meeting to enact the above resolution be modified so as to incorporate the doctrine of *Terra Nullius* in the same manner as the Doctrine of Discovery, such that learnings and recommendations can be included in the report of the Action Group anticipated to be delivered at the 2025 Annual Meeting.

always members\* of the SAH team present on Sunday mornings to talk with them.

We will have a leaflet on the Welcome Table which you can give to them with instructions for how and when to contact us. From there, either their questions will be answered or they can set up an interview with Andrea on her days in the office.

A quick update, as it's been a while: We had a whopping 167 newcomers arrive in 2023 and are bracing for another record year in 2024. We will already have 12 by the end of January – an Afghan family, an Ethiopian family, a Syrian Kurdish family and a single Syrian man.
