Getting to Know Rev. Ben Robins

The following are condensed excerpts from Rev. Ben's application, shared with his permission, to further introduce him to you. Submitted by Linda Cherry, a member of the Search Committee.



My Goal for Ministry: To help a congregation be fully alive: soulfully grounded, spiritually open, intellectually rigorous; engaging and interweaving multiple outlooks, balancing beloved traditions and excellence with creative experiments, honouring the full range of

the human experience, and pushing the envelope of what is possible in changing lives, communities and the world.

Leadership Style: I have a down-to-earth, relational presence. I bring curiosity and compassion. I am collaborative and adaptive. From my physics background, I bring disciplined analytical thinking. From my improv dance background, I bring creativity, artistry and playfulness. I journey with you through life, individually and collectively. Remind you of who you want to be. Look at life from every angle and encourage you to do the same. I meet you where you are, and show that I understand and respect you, before inspiring or challenging you to change.

Sharing the Work

My role: To remind the congregation of who you want to be. Inspire you to live authentically, fully, and generously. Challenge you to grapple with the questions of life. Officially responsible for Sunday services. Open to being responsible for adult programming.

In partnership: In practice, Sunday services are collaborations among worship leaders, musicians, minister and congregation. Pastoral care is often done in partnership with the minister, the caring committee and informal relationships, each playing a part.

The congregation: Decides its vision and commitments. Governs itself. Fulfills its commitments through volunteer work, personal growth, showing up to share congregational life.

Incorporating Creativity

I love music, the arts and creativity. My musical background includes 8 years of classical piano, time in several community choirs, and singing around the campfire at Unicamp. I like spontaneous music jams, circle dances, playing with rituals.

And from Rev. Ben, earlier

Hello UUCH, I am so glad to be joining you. My wife Tanya and I are about to start a retreat in the high desert, so for now I will simply say that I have enormous respect for your history, enormous respect for those of you I have already met, and enormous respect for your vision as the world enters a future full of both challenge and opportunity. I look forward to knowing you deeply, sharing life, and doing the shared work of UU ministry.

Ways to Address the Climate Crisis

The news can be overwhelming these days: melting ice shelves, banks defying the push to defund the fossil fuel industry, droughts out west, a potentially calamitous wildfire season etc., etc.

What is a person to do?

One good thing to do is to read articles on the **Climate Story Network.** These are good news stories about climate action projects in Nova Scotia which can be found at <u>https://www.climatestorynetwork.ca</u>.

Our speaker on April 28th, Sean Kelly, a member of the network's Board of Directors, will share the network's goals and how it works.

CSN is an initiative of *Climate Focus*, a non-profit organization that is dedicated to covering stories about climate solutions.

There are also a number of options for action during **Earth Fest, April 18th to 22nd** this year. I will be out of town so am not available to organize the People's Climate March that we participated in last year, but there will be another one, on Saturday, April 20th. There will also be a calendar of the various events for the whole of Earth Fest, available soon.

For those who want a more science-based project, join the Climate Crisis Team and Rev. Charles Bull for a facilitated workshop called **Climate Fresk.** In just three hours this collaborative workshop will teach you the fundamental science behind climate change and empower you to take action. Even if you think you know all about the science, most participants find more details they weren't aware of, and are able to work together to find climate solutions. Search, a novel

"How does the search reflect, or not reflect, a true democratic process and a fair representation of the AUUCC's membership? Where might you have changed the design of the search? Do you feel they struck the right balance

between consensus and integrity in the voting process?"

That's a question from the book club kit of author Michelle Huneven's extremely funny novel *Search*, which will be the **subject of our service on April 21**. The widely praised book was called "delightful" and "wry and thoughtful" by the AP, and the *New York Times* review added, "This novel has plot, character, structure and a delicious, deeply human pettiness that I think most honest readers will relate to."

Is there really sufficient material, in a UU church search committee's year-long quest for a new minister, to sustain a novel? (Oh, is there ever.)

In this gap of time before our own new minister arrives this fall, here's an interesting opportunity for us to consider from a slightly different perspective what it means to be a UU, what kind of community each of us is seeking, and some of the paths that can get us closer to (or further from!) the shared experiences we hope to create.

I will lead a **one-time book club on this title,** if there's interest, sometime during the week of April 15. If you'd like to participate, order or check out a copy of *Search*, and let me know you want to join. I loved the book, and I'm sure many of you would thoroughly enjoy it, as well.
