RE Family Outing Saturday April 14, 1 pm

In 2018, the RE Committee is running a pilot program of Family Outings. These outings are open to any individual or family involved with UUCH—not just those with young kids. April's RE Family Outing will be to the **Body Worlds Exhibit at the Museum of Natural History**, Saturday April 14 at 1 pm. This exhibit artfully displays (real) human bodies in a way that is designed to teach people about the human body and human health. Since April's UUCH theme is Transformation & Change, we will briefly discuss, both before and after viewing, how these concepts apply to death and to the exhibit.

Hike the Shubenacadie Canal Trail Saturday, April 21, 12:30 pm

The Saturday April 21 hike will be a visit to the part of the Shubenacadie Canal that joins Lake Charles with Lake William. Because Lake Charles is the high point of the canal system, the water in this stretch flows to the Bay of Fundy. This is a pretty section of the canal with rapids and wet lands, and the ruins of the marine railway that carried boats and barges between the lakes. I particularly like the spillway with its rapids on one side of the path and the stillness of the canal on the other.

Meet at the church at 12:30 or under the first overpass over the Waverley Road outbound at 1 pm. This location is also served by the Halifax Transit 55 service. Call my cell at 902-483-4731 if you are lost or running late.

Religious Exploration

March was an eventful and productive month for RE. An average of 7.25 children attended RE per week, a 12% decrease since 2017—so please, tell all your friends with kids about our wonderful RE program!



I am pleased to announce a pilot project in which Agne Kibiliute, a professional artist and art teacher affiliated with the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia, will be teaching an art class to our children based on the theme of the month. We kicked off the first session on March 18th when Agne's class pulled off some risky moves like blowing paint.

Jesse has started getting our raised vegetable garden ready for the summer; the seeds that the children selected have already been started. Last year volunteers helped us to weed, protect, and renew the soil in one of the garden beds (to wonderful results). We will soon be looking for help to repeat this process with the second bed.

I'd like to thank the following volunteers for their contributions to RE teaching in March: Danielle Saulnier, Pam Berman, Jesse Robson, and Troy Saulnier.

I'd also like to thank Jesse Robson for organizing our outing to the Oval outdoor skating rink, which was followed by an exploration and discussion of the Indigenous art exhibit on the Halifax Commons. Our next excursion will be to the BodyWorlds exhibit at the Museum of Natural History on Saturday April 14th at 1pm. Please consider joining us on this excursion to learn about anatomy and how to take good care of our bodies. Jesse has thoughtfully prepared a sensitive introduction to prepare the children for the material we will be examining.



In March we kicked off a program of inviting congregational volunteers to join the Sunday RE activities. This is a great way to create connections between the children and adults in the congregation, and for other adults not typically involved in RE to give us feedback on our programming. I'll be sending another call-out soon to fill out the April schedule.
