Minister's Notes

Thank you all ...

The final "formal" stage of training for a UU minister is called "Preliminary Fellowship." After completing all the training requirements and finding a position as minister, the new minister is required to complete three years in "Preliminary Fellowship." As of July 1st I have completed my second year of this process. (I did not register for the process during my first year in Halifax.) Now, I have one more year to go and then I hope to be granted "Full and Final Fellowship" at the Unitarian Universalist General Assembly in New Orleans in 2017! You are all invited! Of course, you are all invited—you have all been the most important component of my final training.

The process requires written evaluations each year from the Board of the church, from the Committee on Shared Ministry and from my mentoring minister, the Reverend Carole Martignacco in North Hatley Quebec. In addition, I must submit a personal evaluation and a plan for the coming year. I am enjoying the experience in Halifax more than I can express in words. I will be forever grateful to the congregation.

I mentioned the Committee on Shared Ministry. This small committee reports directly to the congregation and is responsible for advising the Board on how well we are living our mission, which is: ... to provide a community that nurtures personal and spiritual growth, practices inclusiveness, celebrates diversity and affirms individual and collective commitment to community service and social justice.

The Committee on Shared Ministry is presently made up of Kathy Spencer, Martha Wilson, Paul Galbraith and me. This group is my trusted sounding board and I am very grateful for their wise and frank counsel and their concern for the welfare of the congregation. How we go about living into our mission statement is the responsibility of the Board and the various

leaders in the congregation. This takes me to the last point that I want to make in this mid-summer newsletter. The Board has planned a full-day retreat at the Atlantic School of Theology on Saturday August 22nd. You will read about it elsewhere within these pages. The retreat will be open in the afternoon and evening session for every member of the church who has an interest in leadership in any of its forms within the congregation. It is open to members of the congregation only, but we can facilitate membership before the retreat, for anyone who has been considering that step. I am looking forward to a stimulating and inspiring retreat with our leaders.

Finally, Janet and I will be traveling to Ontario from August 5th to August 17th to visit my daughters and to return to my hometown in Thunder Bay. I hope that you too are enjoying the summer and anticipating activities with your friends and loved ones.

Minister's Discretionary Fund

As you might imagine, your minister has the frequent opportunity to assist members and friends of the congregation as well as strangers in need, in a number of ways.



There are occasions when a small amount of assistance with food, bus tickets or clothing etc. can make a great difference to someone who is desperate for help.

At other times money may be needed to avoid eviction or other more major crisis. In almost all cases, you will never hear of these requests directly, and that is as it should be.

At times like these, I am extremely grateful for the long-standing tradition in our congregation of maintaining a "Minister's Discretionary Fund." Having such a fund requires that I carefully assess the need presented and sometimes this means saying no. The fact that the congregation has maintained such a fund is a blessing to the community and to your minister, for it provides resources to support my pastoral ministry.

The fund is replenished by contributions made directly by members and friends of UUCH. It is not funded from our operating budget or from money received in regular pledges. I am writing at this time, because the fund is getting low.

If you would like to contribute to this fund, knowing that I will be a good steward of your gift and ensure that it is used to meet a real need for a member of the congregation, or a friend or neighbour of the church, you may mark a cheque "for Minister's Discretionary Fund", or put money in an envelope so marked, and leave it in the collection plate. Alternatively, you can give it to Sandra in the office or to me directly. All cheques should be made payable to UUCH. These contributions are tax-deductible charitable donations for which you will receive a receipt.

Planned Music Projects for Fall 2015

I have been working this summer on a new approach to music participation for the upcoming church year, which will consist of music projects, rather than an ongoing choir, linked to the monthly themes that Rev Horofker and many other Canadian UU churches are using. I hope you will take these opportunities to participate in the music projects that fit with your schedule and interest. I welcome singers, instrumentalists, and percussionists to join in our joyful noise!

For September, on the theme of Promise, two pieces for the Ingathering Service, September 13th.

The first, called *Wherever You May Go*, has a beautiful melody and the chorus is a wonderful promise: "Wherever you may go, I will follow, and your people shall be my people too. Wherever you may go, I will follow, for I would be faithful, loyal and true." The lyrics of the last verse are: "From beginning to the end I will always be your friend, when you need me, I'll be there, you can trust my faithful care."

The second piece is called *Cycle Song of Life*, sub-titled *The River Song*. Its chorus lyrics are: "And the river just keeps flowin' on and on. The sun keeps goin' round to bring the dawn. And life keeps going 'til it looks as though it's gone, but it really just keeps flowin' on and on." This fits well with the theme, and with the 'blending of the waters' on this Sunday.

For October, on the theme of Grace, two pieces for Sunday, October 4th.

The first is a short simple number, *How Deep the Peace*, with opportunities for harmony.

The second number, *Blessed*, is very singable, and also has opportunities for harmony, as well as instrumentation. Each verse and chorus ends with: "*Oh*, *blessed are we this day*."

I look forward to wide participation from every age and stage of music lover in these ongoing music projects. There will be many opportunities to run over the music before and after services. I hope to make the music available on MP3s or YouTube, so they will be easy to go over at home.

UUCH 'Speaks' to this Visitor

The following message was received via our website following a recent memorial service I officiated at UUCH:

"After attending a funeral at your church yesterday, I have to say I was quite surprised by what I heard, or rather, what I didn't hear. A long-standing (lapsed) Catholic from a First Nation, I have only ever attended Catholic funerals. I dread them. All I feel is anger and frustration when it comes to religion. I simply cannot support such a close-minded institution, and so I have not, for most of my adult life.

"So here I go to this dreaded funeral, and instead of God, and Hell, Ridiculous Stories and Guilt, I hear about the person who died. I hear stories of his life from different people. I hear Community and I hear that Love is Love. I see a Pride flag hanging in your window. I hear and see the acceptance of my love of nature and spirit. And so, I will investigate further.

"I simply wanted to let you know that I was surprised and happy to see that loving, open minds who find joy in science and nature may actually be wanted somewhere."

The visitor's email speaks to how many people out there have not yet heard of us but need to. I have responded to the person who reached out, and hopefully they will join us in a service in the near future.

I hope everyone reading this will welcome every new visitor to our services.

UUCH Participates in Pride for 19th Year



Despite inclement weather, thirty UUs and friends showed their pride with UUCH this year at Halifax's 28th Annual Pride Parade.

This year's theme was a celebration of the UU church's performance of same-sex marriages in Canada since the days of disco (1974 to be exact) under the "Standing on the Side of Love" banner.

It was a year of firsts: Norm's dolled-up yellow Standing on the Side of Love Jeep debuted to lead the parade float. We added some special effects: an industrial soap bubble machine, and a more powerful sound system pleased the crowd, who we caught breaking into song as the catchy 70s era tunes of our float came by.

Helen McFadyen and Alison Chipman played our blushing 70's era brides, with Rev. John Baros-Johnson "officiating." Stephen Butler was the life of the party, wowing the crowd with his spontaneous dancing and often sweeping Faith Piccolo up into some fancy footwork. An audience of 100,000 was expected to watch the 130 parade entries, but only about three-quarters that many turned out due the weather (which nevertheless cleared up for the parade itself).

For the first time, an After Pride BBQ was held at the church, with live music provided by the After Choir and grill master Allyn Clarke manning the barbecue. Next year promises to be better than ever; already lots of ideas are percolating. Anyone willing to choreograph a synchronized dance routine?
