Minister's Notes

Humility and Wonder

Our "Church Theme" for December is Wonder. The first of the six sources referred to by UU's is: "Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to the renewal of the spirit and openness to the forces that create and uphold life"

It was Albert Einstein who wrote: "There are only two ways to live your life. One is as though nothing is a miracle. The other is as though everything is a miracle." That sense of duality does not reflect my experience however.

The word miracle is derived from the Latin *miraculum*, "object of wonder." I can't imagine living my life treating every event, every object as a miracle. For most of my life, I accept things and events as mundane. I don't know how you could get through a day without making this simplification.

But it is a simplification! Because in truth, everything is a miracle, a source of wonder. The entire visible universe was at one point compressed in to a space tinier than an atom. Is the universe and everything in it not a source of wonder? The human brain is the most complex device known to humanity and generates itself spontaneously when nurtured in community. Are we not all sources of wonder?

Unlike the dichotomy proposed by Einstein, I live my life mostly as if nothing was a miracle, with occasional moments of insight when the miraculous nature of it all moves my spirit and opens me to the forces that create and uphold life.

This is surely one of the purposes of church, to increase the opportunity for us to see our experience of life with wonder. To acknowledge that we may be able to define the laws of nature that make this incredible world possible, but we will never be able to explain why such sublime laws should exist.

There are many competing strains within the human spirit. One acknowledges with humility the fact that reality will always exceed our knowledge and that the universe is stranger than we can ever comprehend. Another strives to reduce everything that we encounter to the consequences of a few fundamental laws of physics, perhaps even one grand unifying theorem so that everything can be explained as the result of a previous set of conditions.

A Unitarian Universalist is called upon to live life as if nothing is a miracle, because of the practical requirements for making our way in the world. And a Unitarian Universalist is called upon to live life as if everything is a miracle because everything is a source of wonder and all of it is a precious gift.

You, the members and friends or our church, live most of your lives trying to get by in a world where a grain of sand is just another piece of dust that can create a problem in the wrong place. It is the role of the hour that we spend in community on Sunday morning to help us to live into a world where, to paraphrase William Blake: we can see the universe in that grain of sand.

UUCH Refugee Sponsorship Report

We have a committee: ten original members, four new members, and a list of interested people. The current UUCH Refugee Sponsorship Committee is co-chaired by Margaret Galbraith and Andy Blair. Wietske Gradstein is recording secretary, Kathy Spencer is treasurer and has already developed charts of interested people and their intended contributions, Barbara Harsanyi writes for the church newsletter and Colleen Ashworth, Molly Hurd, Sylvia Mattinson, Leela Pendse Shaw and Marilyn Shinyei are the other members. Colleen and Molly attended an ISANS (Immigration Services Association of Nova Scotia) meeting recently and invited four interested people to join us: Amira Al Kasem, Beth Abbott, Layla Yousef and Reem Al Husni. They participated fully in the November 11th UUCH refugee committee meeting. In addition, the following receive our minutes: Allyn Clarke, Dean White, Deborah Wiggins, Janet and Norm Horofker, Jim Morrison, Myron Hedderson (Fredericton) and Steven McCavour (Saint John).

We have a specific family we want to sponsor. At the November 11th meeting, through the Private Sponsorship process, a motion to sponsor certain family members of Nawras (who are now in Lebanon) was carried unanimously.

The family we are sponsoring consists of two groups. They fit our criteria defined previously and are relatives of Nawras, a pre-med student already in Halifax. All happen to be Druze, a religious minority threatened in Syria. All are originally from the city of Al Swaydaa, Southern Syria, which has been/is bombed daily. Both groups live under temporary conditions in Boqaata, Lebanon. One consists of Nawras's mother, Sharifa, age 43, English tutor, and

her younger daughter, Anwar, age 9. They are registered UNHCR refugees.

The second family group consists of Nawras's older sister, Noor, age 25, pregnant, with delivery expected soon, her husband, Diaa, age 25, and their daughter Sarah, age 2. They are not yet registered UNHCR refugees because the process had been stopped by the time they fled Syria. Nawras's father, a lawyer, age 44 and younger brother, age 19, an engineering student who speaks English, crossed the sea to Greece in August, travelled to Germany but have only temporary, 3-month residence permits. They cannot be sponsored by Canadians or be sponsors for other members of their family at this time.

We will do this through the Private Sponsorship Process (PSP). This must be followed if a particular group of refugees is selected by the sponsor rather than the Blended Visa Office Referred Program (BVOR) which comes up with weekly lists of refugees through a process that private sponsors have no input into. The disadvantage of the PSP is that the sponsoring group is responsible for all expenses during the first year, while in the BVOR, the government is responsible for about half the cost during the first year. Private sponsors must go through a Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH), in our case, the CUC.

The Canadian government finances transportation through a loan given to the refugees. A welcome change announced by the new liberal Minister for Refugees, Immigration and Citizenship, the Hon. John McCallum, is that refugees, upon arrival in Canada, whether PSP or BVOR, will be entitled to the same free health care available to other Canadians.

We have identified groups of related practical tasks and the people to do them:

- Funding Kathy Spencer (pledges)

- **Furnishings** Sylvia Mattinson
- Orientation to life in Halifax Colleen Ashworth
- Job search Barbara Harsanyi

With this arrangement sub-committees may be formed and work together on their task without everybody having to attend every meeting.

Christmas Hamper Drive

In December we will once again collect funds and food for our annual Christmas Hamper Drive which the congregation has supported so enthusiastically and warmly for the past few years.



This year we will support three initiatives:

- The Building Bridges program of the Canadian Mental Health Association. The Halifax residents who receive our gift bags have limited contact with others; nearly all of them are entirely housebound. Many of them have said how much our gifts meant to them over the Christmas period.
- A local family, unaffiliated with any organization, who are living in great need but are nonetheless stretching their very limited income to feed and care for stray and abandoned cats.
- Child Haven International. Founded by Unitarians Bonnie and Fred Cappuccino, Child Haven supports women and children in India, Bangladesh, Nepal and Tibet.

The collected funds won't necessarily be divided into thirds; rather, we'll purchase appropriate amounts for the local projects and send the remainder to Child Haven.

If you make a donation and you prefer that your contribution go to one initiative or another, just let us know at the time. (We realize many people in the congregation already support Child Haven monthly.) The Hamper Drive is now part of the Social Responsibility Committee but will still be organized by Martha and Avard.

Cheques (made out to UUCH, clearly marked "Hamper Drive") can be given to either of us, or placed in the collection plate. Food donations (for humans or cats) can be left at the church. We will be collecting through December 13th. As always, thanks so much for your support.

A letter to my UUCH family

Dear friends: As we weave through the busyness of the holiday season, the emotional energy we sometimes expend can be very draining.

I have taken on an additional intense feature to my own seasonal hubbub. On January 12th, I will be leaving Halifax and our beloved Atlantic coast, moving cross-country to the rolling mountains of Kamloops, British Columbia. But this is not goodbye, for you will be with me on this journey.

UUCH was my sponsoring congregation through years of study and internship preparation for Unitarian Universalist ministry. Many among you have contributed generously and with great enthusiasm and optimistic confidence that I would make it as a minister. You provided tons of support-from cash to Airmiles, vitamins to housing, and furniture to references. And I received your expressions of love and support with deep, yet sometimes understated gratitude and humility. 


together bash at the church with "DJ Ace" spinning the music, on Friday, January 8th, from 7:00-9:30 pm!

Throughout November, we've been considering the theme of Integrity. Several members have asked for the titles and authors of books presented during The Story for Children of All Ages. I hope many of you will find it helpful to see that information here. The following titles are all available through any branch of the Halifax Public Library system. I'd like to thank our very own Mary Spurr—as well as staff at the Halifax Public Library. They have been very helpful in introducing us to some great materials. If you need help finding any of these books, I know they'll help you too.

- Touching Truthfulness, a short story from a collection titled, Inspiring Stories of Sportsmanship, by Brian Herzog
- The Man Who Walked between the Towers, by Mordecai Gerstein
- *Grandfather's Journey*, by Allan Say
- Stand Tall!—A Book about Integrity, by Cheri J. Meiners

I'd like to invite you to visit the RE Library. It's located upstairs in the Sophia Lyon Fahs Room. To find it, climb the stairs by the kitchen. Go through the door at the top of the stairs, and turn right. The room is the last door on your right. Feel free to browse any of the shelves to your right as you enter. There are books for young children, adolescents, parents and caregivers. If you'd like to borrow anything, there's a sheet on the table; all you have to do is write your name, contact information, title of the book and the date you borrowed it. Take it home and return it at your

leisure. I'm sorry the *Fahs Room* is not accessible. Anyone who would like to see a specific title, or some other book based on an area of interest, please ask me and I'll get it to you.

Two new titles were just donated to the RE Library. Scott Wood gave us a copy of the beautiful book, *Why Kings and Queens don't Wear Crowns*. It's based on real-life events, and written in beautiful language in fairy tale style. The author of this book is the Norwegian Princess Martha Louise, great-granddaughter of the real-life Norwegian King and Queen in the story. There is also a lovely audio CD to accompany the book.

We also received *two* copies of the book, *Girls Will Be Girls: Raising Courageous and Confident Daughters*, by Joanne Deake, PhD. The author was in Halifax a few years ago, speaking at the Sacred Heart School. She speaks—both in person and in her book—in simple, practical terms about some very complex issues. This book would be of interest to anyone who is involved with the nurturing of young girls of any age in today's crazy, changing world.

At the time that I write this article, I'm looking forward to my first meeting with the RE Committee on November 29th. The RE Committee provides direction to the RE Director. Since this meeting occurs in the future, I don't know what its outcomes will be. Having said that, however, I know that the Committee members are all very dedicated to the RE Programme, and I appreciate their knowledge, skills and experience. I look forward to their guidance and support.

December's theme is Wonder. In keeping with tradition, we will participate in the multigenerational Candlelight Service—a wondrous thing in itself—on December 20th!
