Minister's Notes



Budgets and missions...

At our Semi-annual General Meeting on October 30 the congregation unanimously approved our budget that will take effect in January. That might not sound very unusual, but this particular budget contained three items that are indicative of a generous, growing, healthy, spiritual community.

The first item is our decision to “give away the plate” on Sundays. I didn't attend church much as a child, but the few times I did, my father or mother would give me a quarter or two for the collection plate. That ritual of generosity has stayed with me.

Our congregation has a budget of about \$120,000. Almost all of that amount is raised through the generous pledges made by our members and friends. Most of that amount never sees our collection plate. Pledges are more frequently paid by automatic bank withdrawal or with cheques given during the one-month pledge campaign. And so, “passing the plate” on Sunday has lost some of its significance as a symbol of generosity. In the past few years we have collected about \$2,500 per year in the collection plate that has not been identified as part of a pledge.

It has been the experience of many UU congregations that giving away the money collected in the plate on Sunday (that is not identified as part of a pledge) generates a lot of good will, a sense of generosity, and has ultimately resulted in membership growth, and growth in total pledges.

And so, your Board has decided that beginning in January we will designate a charity each Sunday to receive any money collected in this way. I hope that we will take up the collection while the children are present so that they can have that same experience I had some 60 years ago.

Sometimes you can “kill two birds with one stone” (what a sad thought that is). The second decision of the Board that I want to hold up, is to fund the Saturday morning Neighbourhood Brunch as a mission of the congregation. Since its inception the Brunch has been funded by the Minister's professional expenses, the Minister's Discretionary account, and by contributions made to that account for that purpose. This was a way of using the Discretionary Account to plant a seed, and in this case, it has taken root. Each Saturday 6 to 8 volunteers prepare and serve a wonderful buffet meal with tablecloths and flowers to thirty or so of our neighbours. In order to help fund this, the Board has decided to use the proceeds from the collection plate (again, not designated for pledges) to fund the Brunch on two Sundays of each month.

And the third new initiative in the budget is the funding of the Parents and Tots play group that meets at our church on Thursday mornings. Molly Hurd initiated this program and it has grown to where we have close to twenty parents attending with their children. This serves a real need in our neighbourhood, where many people connected with the faculties of the neighbouring universities have spouses who are at home with small children. Many of these parents are new to Canada and a long way from home. The Parents and Tots program provides a social outlet for parents and children and exposes more people from our neighbourhood to our church. Tanya, our Director of Religious Exploration, makes regular social visits to the group as well. This particular budget line amounts to \$800—and \$600 of that was a gift from a family who are participating in the program.

Three new initiatives in our budget representing our community outreach ... makes me happy!

Christmas Hamper Drive



Succession planning is important in any organization, and you'll be happy to know that the future of the UUCH Christmas hamper drive is in good hands. My family took on this project with Mary Ellen and Peter Onno after Helen McFadyen moved to B.C. Helen was the originator of the program, in which we raise funds from within the congregation and fill bags with holiday treats for Canadian Mental Health program clients. These individuals, identified by a CMHC staff member, tend to be people who suffer greatly from anxiety or phobias and are largely housebound.

My children, who are now in grades 11 and 8, were helped last year with the holiday shopping by the Saulnier family children: Kyla, Tristan, Destiny, Abigail and Jason. This year our two families will assemble the bags together with my daughters explaining the steps to the younger children. Next Christmas the Saulnier kids will take the lead on this, and my children will be the helpers; and that year (2018) will be my family's final year of involvement with this initiative. So look for this project to evolve and change over the next couple of years.

We will be collecting money at UUCH for the Christmas hampers through Sunday, December 17.

If you would like to make a contribution, please put it in the offering plate, clearly marked for this project. Our CMHC contact reports that a number of clients say our gifts are a true high point of their holidays. Please don't feel obligated to give to this; if you choose to, however, know that your contributions will make a real difference in the holidays of a person who is lonely.

Sharifa, of the Althyab family we sponsored two years ago, has started a small home sewing business and welcomes new customers.

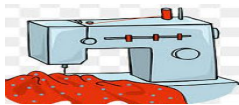

Canvass Report

Darla and Robin have provided us with a visual report each Sunday in November as they demonstrated the “Fine Balance” with which our pledge campaign is unfolding. Sunday, November 26th they reported that we were 90% of the way to our goal of \$122,850.

As of press time we have crept up a little bit to 92% with a grand total of \$112,722 pledged. We have definite numbers from 83 out of 94 pledge units. There are still several new people to talk to, a handful who are unable to confirm a pledge at this moment and a few more who haven't returned calls but whose pledges we are pretty sure we can count on. At this point we are predicting a final count around \$118,000. So we could be about \$5,000 short of our goal.

That means that in the New Year, when the final count is in, the Board will need to reconsider the budget for 2018 and either make cutbacks or decide to access money that we tucked into savings when we had a surplus in 2016.

The Canvass Team has worked hard to reach everyone by our completion goal of November 30th. Huge thanks to our great team of Mia Huh, Pam Berman, Scott Wood, Margaret Galbraith, Sylvia Mattinson, Paul Galbraith, Darla Muzzerall and Glenda Butt and to all of you for being so responsive and generous.

Kitchen Reno Update



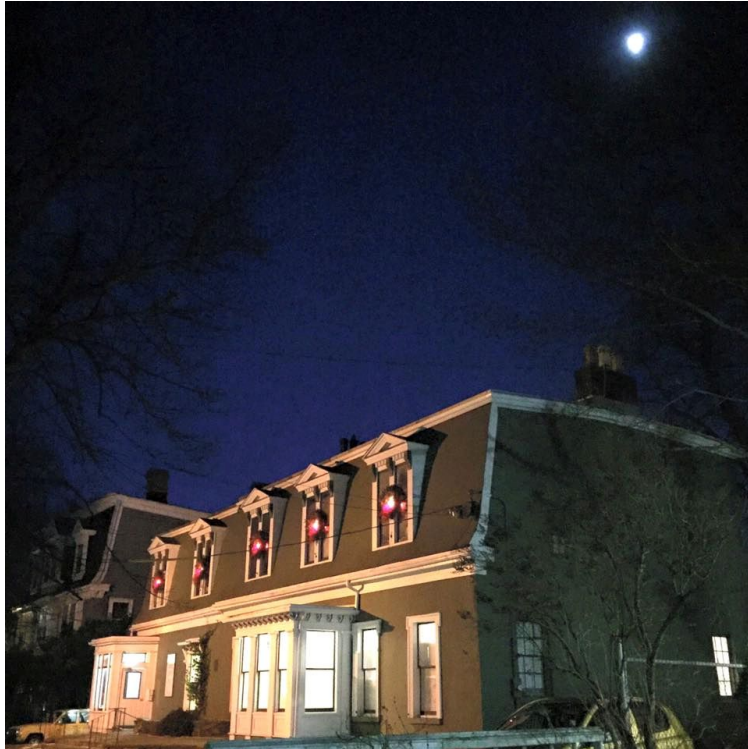
