February and Resilience

The story of the Universalist Unitarian Church of Halifax is a story of resilience. Ministers and members and buildings come and go, but our congregation continues on.

As I write this for the February newsletter the transitions in the life of our congregation are foremost in my mind—because our Office Administrator of 25 plus years of service will be retiring at the end of February. Sandra Jamieson has been an island of calm and consistency as minister's and board members, treasurers and committee members came and went. She has been a source of resilience through it all. I think her resilience was born in her Cape Breton childhood.

I can personally attest to her patience in adapting to the changes that new board members and new ministers bring. I will always be grateful for her support and for her long service to our congregation and I wish her many long and happy years in retirement.

The people that our congregation has helped to find refuge in Canada are another powerful lesson in resilience. Last Sunday Abdul Jalab attended our service to express his appreciation. This young man had to flee Syria to South Korea



and live there for three years facing possible deportation back to Syria. He is now starting a new life in Canada thanks in no small part to our congregation. Could any one of us match his resilience?

We acknowledged in church last Sunday our pride in the fact that members of our congregation, Leslie and Allan Shaw made possible the creation of a new Wilderness Park within the borders of Halifax, a park twice as big as Point Pleasant park. Nature is amazingly resilient when given a chance, and this new park, within city limits is the kind of chance it needs.

My wish for each of you is that you may find a source for resilience in your life that helps you through the inevitable blows of fate and mortality. May our loving and supportive community at UUCH be a resource for the resilience we all need to to see us through to the other side.

MAKING WAVES CONFERENCE, HALIFAX THREE MONTHS AWAY AND COUNTING!



Making Waves is just three months away now, and lots is happening. The details for the event are taking shape and it's pretty exciting!

Much more will be known when CUC opens up its website for the conference, with information about the workshops, the costs, the registration forms, etc. This will happen in early February. You will be able to connect to the CUC conference website (when available) by going to the CUC home page: cuc.ca, and following the links to the conference information. Norm's proposal for a ukulele workshop has been approved by CUC and has been scheduled for Sunday afternoon.

We don't know the details yet of the pricing for the conference, but we do know that CUC is looking at some new approaches on this. Also, there are options for people who are not registering for the whole conference, to buy tickets to specific social events like the Saturday night dinner and ceilidh or the Sunday night closing banquet. And of course the Sunday morning worship service is free and open to all. So people who don't feel up to attending the workshops or who have to work on Saturday or Sunday can still participate in a lot of the fun. LET'S MAKE IT A GOAL for every member of the UUCH community to get to at least one conference event.

Molly has designed an attractive T-shirt featuring the Making Waves logo and using seaside colours. It will be on sale as a wonderful memento of the conference. CUC will provide aprons to be worn by volunteers to identify them during their shifts.

The UUCH Host Committee team is filling out. There is a separate article in this newsletter which lists all the required Host Committee functions and open positions. Please look at it and decide where you can help. **REMEMBER, VOLUNTEERS HAVE MORE FUN!**

Is anyone willing to offer some home hospitality during the conference? Some attendees are on a tight budget, and other attendees like to have a homestay instead of the dormitory. If you might be able to offer accommodation, please let Elinor Egar-Reynolds know what you can offer. The requests for homestays will be coming in soon, with the registration forms, and Elinor will need to start making assignments.

The communications team has provided Making Waves content to go on the UUCH website, and once it is in place we will be using that in future promotions. A promotional piece on Maritime music and the terrific line up of music which we will have at Making Waves has been created as a follow-up to the vacation planning piece which went out in November. The piece on Maritime Music will appear in the CUC eNews which goes to about 3000 people and will be on the CUC conference website. We have also sent it directly to UU congregations across Canada. The purpose, as with the vacation planning piece, is to let people know that Making Waves in Halifax will be a really great time. We are planning one more promotional piece for February.
