Minister's Notes



January's
Theme:
Imagination

I begin these notes with a heartfelt Happy New Year to you all. At this time last year, I certainly had no idea how COVID-19 would disrupt life as we knew it. Our theme for January is *Imagination* but the part of my brain that deals with imagination is telling me that for 2021 there are just too many variables to contemplate. And so, I move forward with faith that we will continue to build our community regardless.

Under the circumstances it was a good year for us. My pressing concern is for those who do not have ready access to the internet, and especially those living in extended care facilities, cut off from much that was happening in our community. We are all hoping for an early release from the social distancing and the masks and our hearts go out to those who are really suffering mentally and physically in the midst of this pandemic.

Despite the restrictions we have taken some major initiatives this year. We have launched a pilot for the UU Wellspring Program with 8 volunteers from the program. In fact, we were oversubscribed. UU Wellspring is an Adult Religious Exploration program designed to help people develop their sense of UU spirituality in the context of an intimate small-group setting. We expect to start a new group in the fall.

We have re-established our Truth Healing and Reconciliation Task Team, and launched our Dismantling Racism Task Team.

Since last June, I have been wrestling with reimagining my role as your minister. It has been, and continues to be, an evolutionary process. I have been focussing on the aspects of the congregation that are clearly part of our ministry and working with the committees and task teams that come under that umbrella. I am looking for ways to reduce my commitment of time to things not related to ministry.

The table below lists the existing committees and task teams that I am working with, along with the time of the monthly meetings and the chair of each team. One of the things that has changed forever is that if you have computer access, it is no longer necessary to travel to attend meeting which makes it easier to schedule meetings.

If you would like to be more involved with the congregation (an excellent New Year's resolution) I encourage you to contact any one of the committee chairs, and watch for new developments in this regard.

The board held its last meeting of the year on December 16th—the perfect opportunity to reflect on the past year.

We were all impressed by the adaptability and the resiliency shown by the congregation during a tumultuous year. Norm and the Worship Committee quickly and successfully transitioned to online services. The Coffee House and Blue Christmas service went virtual.

The Religious Exploration Program for Children and Youth found richness through outdoor activities, while the UU Wellspring program was launched for adult spiritual exploration.

The Saturday Brunch adjusted to the evolving group size restrictions to ensure this project continued to support our community.

The Caring Committee reached out to members who were in social isolation. All these adjustments took time and effort from staff and volunteers but showed the resourcefulness of our congregation.

The board also looked ahead to next year to plan how to navigate the challenges ahead. We will continue to follow the health guidelines to reopen the sanctuary to a larger group as it becomes safe to do so.

Our small congregation also set out a bold objective to ensure that our staff receives a living wage—and our historic building requires some important exterior maintenance.

We were sorry to have Katherine Hutka resign from the board due to pressures of other commitments. She is still a loyal UUCH member, however.

We wish everyone and their families a great start to 2021 and look forward to continuing to adapt and

grow as a congregation with all the new challenges the new year will bring.

Say No to Nuclear Weapons

Dear Friends,

In the spirit of advancing Canada's longtime commitment to global nuclear dis-

armament, please sign the following House of Commons e-petition calling on the Government of Canada to accede to the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW). Access via:

On January 22, 2021, this United Nations Treaty will become international law, thus finally declaring nuclear weapons illegal. However, nuclear weapons will only be illegal for those nations which have acceded to the Treaty, which currently stands at 51 nations. An additional 86 countries have signed the Treaty. Canada has not signed or acceded.

The International Committee of the Red Cross has stated that no government or international agency could possibly respond to the humanitarian needs after any use of nuclear weapons. Furthermore, there is no vaccine for the effects of a nuclear weapons detonation.

The only solution is to prevent such a humanitarian disaster by being proactive. The more signatures, the stronger the petition. Please sign and distribute.

Closing date of this petition is February 6, at 2:00 pm EST, after which the petition will be verified and sent to Elizabeth May to be read in the House of Commons. The petition will also elicit an official response from the Government of Canada.

Earl Turcotte, chairperson of Canadian Network to Abolish Nuclear Weapons has stated "This is an excellent initiative that can help press the Government of Canada to take action in support of nuclear disarmament."

Although we may have good reason to look forward to leaving last year behind, I am also looking forward to resuming our outdoor Religious Exploration program which has been a highlight of 2020 for me. This won't be immediately in the new year, but once restrictions lift we will brave the winter weather and spend more time surrounded by nature.



We finished 2020 with a virtual Religious Exploration program in December, meeting via zoom. Through games and storytelling, we continued to discover some of the many interdependent connections found among various animal species, between animals and plants, as well as between ourselves and the natural world.



We discovered how using only the sense of hearing, we could deepen our appreciation for the nature that surrounds us. contemporary solstice celebrations and the many symbols that are familiar to those who

celebrate Christmas. Families were also given pine cones and birdseed to make bird feeders at home and continue celebrating together. Although begun online, I hope this is the beginning of an RE tradition of marking the winter solstice every year.

Although uncertain of whether RE will continue to be virtual or in person during January, we will continue to deepen our appreciation and respect for the interdependent web of all existence.
