Finding Our Centre

We find ourselves now at the beginning of a new year, and we are also more than four months into this period of my transitional ministry with this congregation. I am personally very excited to dive further into exploring and experimenting with different programming and ways of gathering on Sundays. We've now experienced one Sunday of conversational gathering, and I'm planning on repeating this experiment over the course of the next few months. I also would like to incorporate opportunities for sharing feedback on this experience on Sundays when we try out different programming ideas.

While I remain excited about these ideas, I also want to draw wisdom from the eponym of January itself, Janus the Roman god of duality and transitions. Janus is typically depicted with a double sided face, gazing to both the past and the future. This image reminds me of the importance of leading from the centre — honouring what was and embracing what must be. What's more, it reminds me that moving forward is made more meaningful by embracing some stillness in the transition.

Our theme this month is finding our centre, and I hope we will allow ourselves to cherish the stillness of the wintry January centre to savour and appreciate who we are, even as we dream of what might yet be.

UUCH Sponsorship Agreement Holder News

As I wrote this on December 28th, our last newcomers for 2022, a family of eight, were flying from Toronto to Halifax in the evening. That makes a total of 116 newly arrived refugees in 2022. You will recall that travel was almost stopped completely in 2220 and 2021 due to the pandemic.



Selamawit, her daughter Eldanam, and niece Rahwa are Eritreans who arrived in November and are doing very well living with Selamawit's brother's family here in Halifax.

No doubt 2023 will bring even more as we are waiting for 187 people for whom we applied in 2018, 19, 20 and 21. We are very happy to report that the Syrian Kurdish family of 8 still waiting in Turkey since 2018 will arrive on January 17th! Their destination is Mahone Bay.

Add to that 187, another 198 from 2022 and you get a sense of the numbers we are dealing with. 65 of the 198 are Afghans who are being expedited; 16 of them have already arrived.

I would remind you that our role is to accept candidates for our waiting list, submit applications for them to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada, and monitor their well-being after they arrive. A settlement group, which may be a family or an established refugee sponsorship group, does the hard work of raising money for their first year in Canada, finds them accommodation and supports them in every way through that first year.

Our SAH team of nine people, includes four UUCH members; we would welcome another UUCH

member to join us. Let us know if you are interested and/or have questions.

Finally, one of the families we hope to see in 2023 is that of Clement and Sophie, the Rwandan Unitarians we have told you about before. We applied for them in July 2020 and for about the last 18 months we have been supporting them financially in their country of asylum. Because of that the money we raised for their first year has been depleted. We will need to do some more fundraising before they arrive so please stand by for a new appeal in the early New Year.

Our Endowment Fund, a Gift to the Future

Some months ago the theme for services at UUCH was *story*. By chance, this theme came along just as our endowment reached the \$100,000 mark—so the Endowment Committee decided to mark the congregation's having met this financial goal by asking a couple of questions of people who have contributed. Among other things, we wondered how people see the endowment fund enlarging the story of UUCH—and how contributing to the endowment fund might become part of the overall story of our lives.



Reflecting first for us on these deeply personal questions is longtime UUCH member Allyn Clarke. (As most of you know, Allyn's wife, Sandra, died at the end of 2019, just as the pandemic was beginning. He subsequently made a donation to the endowment fund in her

memory.) His thoughts on his years in the congregation, and on the ongoing impact the church can have on our piece of the world, are insightful. In considering his time at the church, Allyn noted that he and Sandra began attending in 1970. Please enjoy hearing a bit about his perspective on those years. Allyn's comments are in bold type.

The endowment fund is one of the ways we can feel some hope and relative certainty that UUCH will still be here after we are gone. You have indicated that you intend to support the endowment fund. Can you share a little of what this feels like for you personally, or perhaps say a bit about how it differs, in your mind, from supporting the day-to-day life of the church?

The West Fund was established more than a century ago, and was made available to bring the UUCH out of the ashes in the 60s by providing the funds to hire a minister again. Endowments can be used to fund our dreams.

Do you have a sense of the church having evolved or changed during the time you have been part of it?

The church has changed with its members and ministers. In the 70s the church was dominated with 30-year-olds in couples and with young children. Most were new to Halifax and to UUism. (A New Yorker cartoon showing a figure taking the path labeled "discussion on god" characterized the congregation.) We got older and people left for jobs in other cities, and new members formed their own vision of the church. Book clubs formed, and some lasted, and the Goddess group continued. Through it all we cared for each other and the larger community.

If you look at that same question viewed through a longer time frame—say, from 150 years ago to 150 years from now—what do you feel are some of the most significant contributions our congregation might make to life in our region?

Since its founding, and hopefully continuing, the UUCH has been a community that provides a safe place to explore religious and social issues.

For all of us at UUCH, the church is part of our lives; we are also part of the life of the church. Of the various roles you've filled at UUCH over the years, is there any one that has resonated with you more than the others?

The most meaningful was when Sandra and I were leading a youth group in our living room, with baby Michelle as a participant.

What are some of your hopes for the church in the future, in terms of what the endowment fund may someday make possible?

A donation to the endowment fund is a gift to the future. I am confident that they will use it wisely.
