# MINISTER'S NOTES for July and August

## Calling all those interested in creating great Sunday services at UUCH

So here we are, on the cusp of summer 2018! I am determined to live every day of this summer to the fullest. I was sustained through the winter months by thoughts of this time and now it is here... halleluiah! But I know that these next two months will be gone before I am ready... before I get half of what I want to do done. And one of the projects that I want to put in place before the end of summer involves re-thinking how we plan our Sunday Services.

As I said when describing my epiphany last month; my goal now, is to stop trying to the best minister ever, and instead concentrate on creating the best, most engaged congregation ever. In relation to Sunday services, I have learned a lot over the past six years as your minister, but the preparation of Sunday services has been largely a one-person production with input from the Music Director and the Director of Religious Education.

Starting this fall, I hope to re-invigorate our Worship Committee and make the creation of our Sunday services much more of a team effort. Designing and presenting services can be immensely rewarding and I want to share that experience.

I was inspired by a workshop that I attended at the Canadian Unitarian Conference (CUC) in Hamilton this year. Reverend Wayne Walder presented some exciting ideas on how to structure this process and engage members who have an interest in creating and holding a sacred space during services.

Wayne was instrumental in the founding of the Neighbourhood Unitarian Congregation in Toronto. Wayne is a supportive colleague, a gifted speaker, a skilled administrator and a person of great warmth

and spiritual depth. We are now working to finalize plans to bring Wayne to Halifax to put on a workshop for our congregation on September 29th, and to have him deliver a service on Sunday September 30th.

If you have ever thought about things that you would like to see included in our services, or deleted from our services... if you have an interest in helping to shape our Sunday mornings together to make them even more meaningful, challenging, engaging, sustaining, uplifting, inspiring, and fun... I want you to attend our workshop on September 29th.

Those of you who work with me often may be surprised that I am writing in June about an event I am planning for late September. I do have a reputation for doing things at the last moment. That habit has served me well in many ways, but it does make it difficult to collaborate with others. So, this project is a whole new way of doing business for me. I hope you will support this change and help your minister to make the transition... please!

As for my summer schedule, I will not be delivering Sunday sermons during these months. Dean White has arranged a great line-up of programs. July is deemed a study month for me but I am fully available to you during that time for anything you need, however I will not be keeping office hours. You can reach me by cell phone. August is deemed vacation. I expect to be in the area for most of that time and can be reached if needed. I hope to attend and enjoy most Sunday services over the summer and to see you there.

#### The schedule ...

Friday, July 20, 12 noon to 2 or 3pm: Volunteers are needed at the church to assemble decorations and equipment to be ready for transport from the church on Saturday morning.

## Board Buzz

The June Board meeting did not disappoint for exciting news, updates on ongoing projects and important discussions about planning for our future. It was a long and lively board meeting, but here are some highlights.

On the news front, the UUCH has been accept as a Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH) by the Federal Government, one of only four in Nova Scotia. This will allow us to broaden the assistance we can provide to other organizations assisting refugees coming to Canada. At this meeting the Board passed a series of motions to confirm our commitment and make sure all runs smoothly on the ground. Marilyn Shinyei and Andy Blair will co-chair the UUCH SAH Committee which is already in action allocating our first six "spots".

Also on the news front, the Halifax Early Childhood school is expanding its program and hoping to do some renovations on the second floor of the building. We have shared our space with HECS for many years and are excited to see their plans.

We also had an exciting presentation from Bonnie Coulombe on the work of the UUCH Truth and Reconcilliation Task Group. They have been working hard on a curriculum and reflection process. Plans are being made for a series of workshops in the next three months, including a Blanket Exercise on September 9th.

The Board also voted to create a one-time growth initiative fund to be available for growth-related projects. Committees or groups in the congregation will be able to apply to the Board for small growth project funding, and the Board will use the funds to assist with growth related work.

On the update front, the renovations on the front porch have begun (as anyone who has been at church the last few weeks will know!) As happens with old buildings, new problems are uncovered as we proceed but it is great to see progress and everyone is excited to see our new fully-accessible porch/entry! In the meantime, if you have a tendency to come late to church, sneaking in has become a lot more difficult!

### **Updates from the UUCH Sponsorship Agreement Holder Committee**

Since the exciting news of our gaining Sponsorship Agreement Holder (SAH) status last month we have been busy. We are writing up our processes for long-term management of the sponsorship groups we will be working with, to be approved by the Board. Most of it is work we have already been involved with, however, using CUC as our SAH, so we feel confident in proceeding with the first steps. This certification came with six spaces for refugee applications allocated by Immigration, Refugee and Citizenship Canada, and we have already arranged to fill them.

Our first decision was to support an application for Nairouz Hamthou, the girlfriend/fiancee of Nawras Althyab, whose mother, sisters, nieces and father we have already sponsored. We have almost enough funds in our own Refugee Sponsorship Fund to support this application, so with family support we know will be there, we feel confident in moving on this application right away.

Our other five spaces will be going to support the Shalabi family: parents, and three children, 17, 9 and 7 years of age. They are Palestinians who sought refuge in Syria. Their relatives in Halifax will be co-sponsors with us; they have been involved with previous sponsorships, so are well-prepared for their part. The applications we are preparing with the South Shore Refugee Family Reunification group (SSRFR) for the family of eight Syrian Kurds now living in Istanbul are nearly ready to go, and will hopefully be submitted by month-end. The SSRFR group has done amazing fundraising work, raising more than the required \$39,000 in only eight months. Nawras has also been invaluable in this process. Now a member of our UUCH Refugee Sponsorship Committee, Nawras's computer skills and knowledge of Arabic have greatly facilitated our communications with the family members in Istanbul.

We have also welcomed Susan Stephen to our committee. A long-time member of UUCH, Susan and her husband Michael Jensen will be splitting their time between Tatamagouche and family in Nebraska. Susan is delighted to be able to contribute to Canada's refugee sponsorship process as much as she can.

We do not plan to hold specific fundraising events ourselves in the foreseeable future, but should anyone wish to contribute to the UUCH Refugee Sponsorship Fund, those moneys will always be used to support refugees, whether current (or future!) members of the Althyab family—or other refugees in the future.



#### SPECIAL INVITATION





"Action has meaning only in relationship, and without understanding relationship, action on any level will only breed conflict. The understanding of relationship is infinitely more important than the search for any plan of action." — Jiddu Krishnamurti

Today the newspaper headlines read... "In Canada, Indigenous youth made up 46 per cent of admissions to correctional services in 2016-17 while making up only eight per cent of the youth population."

Over the summer months, members of the UUCH Truth and Reconciliation Task Group will be preparing for the first event in a planned series of events to help us reflect on the history of relationships between indigenous peoples and settlers. As noted in the quotation above, the understanding or relationships must precede making plans of action.

In the spirit of building relationships, we are honoured to be invited to hold our first event, a Blanket Exercise, at the Mi'Kmaq Friendship Centre of Halifax. The KAIROS Blanket Exercise is an interactive learning experience that teaches the history of the relationship between indigenous peoples and settlers. Developed in response to the 1996 Report of the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples—which recommended education on Canadian-Indigenous history as one of the key steps to reconciliation, the Blanket Exercise covers over 500 years of history in a one and a half hour participatory workshop.

You may have participated in a Blanket Exercise in the past. We encourage you to attend this one... the experience is different each time. On **September 9th** we will be led by elders in the Mi'kmaq community of Halifax in a communal experience. Doing this as a congregation will build our understanding as a community and strengthen us as a beloved community for the work ahead.

The invitation to participate in this blanket exercise is extended to members and friends of the UUCH congregation, including children 8 years of age and older. It will be an opportunity to create understanding and relationship between us and our Mi'kmaq friends. Please put this on your calendar.
