Minister's Notes

The "Great Turning" within the UUA

I am writing these notes as I return from the Retreat of the Unitarian Universalist Minister's Association (UUMA) and the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) in Spokane Washington. While the UUA and the CUC (Canadian Unitarian Council) are national bodies, the UUMA serves ministers in Canada and the USA and internationally. I point this out because the issues in our faith tradition cross borders in complex ways, and that fact led to a personal awakening for me in Spokane.

The General Assembly of the UUA in Spokane met under the theme: "The Power / Possibility / Struggle / Joy of We." The Assembly workshops and worship services were a fascinating look into what a truly diverse, passionate, multicultural, Unitarian Universalism looks like. I saw it for five days. It is exciting and challenging, scary and reassuring, messy and visionary, awkward and beautiful... all at once.

Some background: In the spring of 2017, the flawed hiring process for a Regional leader, that by-passed qualified people of colour, triggered the release of pent up racial tensions among religious professionals of colour within the UUA. This event led to subsequent actions by the UUA and UUMA executive that in turn led to the resignation of the President of the UUA and the President of the UUMA and a complete restructuring of the administration of both bodies. The result is nothing short of a revolution within the faith tradition with all the disruption, uncertainty and real risk that comes with that.

Just reading the titles of some of the workshops and events at the General Assembly will give you a sense of what is happening: Combatting Destructive Behavior and White Supremacy Culture – Collaborative Leadership for Collective Liberation – White Supremacy Today – Disrupting White Fragility – Decolonizing Unitarian Universalism – Consensus Decision-Making to Counter Oppression... Granted, there were lots of less controversial titles for workshops, but the theme of revolutionary change was in the air everywhere.

After initial shock, I am now willing to engage in discussions of White Supremacy and White Centering in Unitarian Universalism. There is no denying the fact of White Supremacy in our faith tradition. It is most obvious when we hear the oft repeated phrases... I feel so comfortable here, it is like home, these are my people... Behind that perception of what our congregations provide, is a protection of the status quo for a white centred church. But things are changing. As one person put it, I no longer welcome visitors by telling them that they have found a comfortable home... I say instead, this will be hard work, but it will be rewarding and transformative—and transformation is what church should be about.

I loved what I saw at the General Assembly of the UUA in Spokane. It presented me with a picture of a relevant, bold, dynamic religious identity for our time. I am on study leave for July and vacation in August. I will be using that time to figure out what this means for me personally and as your minister. interesting times ahead!

The Music Director position will hopefully be finalized very shortly.

We also have plans for a structural building assessment to be carried out this summer, and confirmed that we will hold another Congregational Retreat on August 24th—and a Volunteer Fair in September. Look for more details in the August newsletter.

This time, I could not stay to see the competitions, but I was thrilled to find the area where the Indigenous vendors had set up their wares: exciting jewelry, beautiful robes and blankets and etchings that I especially admired.

We were moved by the strong sense of vibrant community of the Mi'kmaq world, that we as non-indigenous Canadians, don't nearly know enough about.
