Join our Vision Contests!

To celebrate our new Vision Statement, the CUC is launching two contests. We hope lots of individuals and congregations will get involved.

- 1. Interconnected Faith Sermon Contest: UUs from across Canada are invited to write a sermon about our Vision Statement and/or the five Aspirations attached to it. Length: between 1,800 and 2,500 words. The sermon must be delivered to a Canadian UU congregation before the deadline of January 1, 2018. The selected winner will receive a cash award of \$150 plus an invitation to present their sermon during the CUC 2018 ACM in Hamilton.
- 2. Canadian Unitarian Art Contest. UUs from across Canada are invited to create a work of art that celebrates our Vision Statement (not the Aspirations). This creation can be a painting, carving, video, song or other work. The work of children and/or RE classes is especially welcome. Deadline: October 1, 2018. Prizes will be awarded in three categories: Children age 12 and younger; children age 13-17; those 18 and older. The winner in each category will receive \$50, and their work will be shared on the CUC website.

Minister's Notes



Funding our Neighbourhood Brunch

Since May of 2015, we have opened our church building for a free "neighbourhood brunch" every Saturday morning.

Now with your help we will be taking the next step in funding this project.

The vision, from the beginning, has been to develop a relationship with our neighbours while promoting our building as a community resource available to serve the neighbourhood. Now, 22 months after starting, we are serving about thirty people every Saturday between 10 am and noon. We have a core of neighbours who drop in, all of whom we know on a first name basis, and we see new faces almost every week. Members of the congregation come to help serve or to participate by socializing over a great meal. I can not think of a better way to spend a Saturday morning.

This project is important for our congregation for a number of reasons:

- 1. Our faith tradition calls us to be in right relation with our neighbours. This applies to the person who lives next door to our home, our church, our country, etc. Our goal of world community is hollow if we are not working to build community in our own neighbourhood. This has practical advantages as well. For example, when we had a recent incident involving a neighbour and the H.E.C.S. I had a relationship with the person and could visit them in their home to resolve the issue.
- 2. Many of our neighbours are hurting. If we believe in justice, equity, and compassion, we are then called to use our resources to help, even in a small way, to manifest these aspirations in the world.
- 3. The Saturday Brunch gives members of the congregation an easy and pleasant way to serve others in the community. On a typical Saturday now, we have about 20 "guests" and 10 members or friends of the congregation. We

have a flexible schedule that makes it easy to participate as a volunteer. There is no better way to ease your own burdens than to serve someone else.

- 4. Our individual spiritual growth requires that we get out of our comfort zone. Building relationships with strangers who may have a very different experience in life and perspective on life is not always easy but it is an important step in our own spiritual growth. We are also providing an opportunity for the spiritual growth of our neighbours by offering a friendly and welcoming experience. This mutuality speaks to our interdependence.
- 5. We have a wonderful message that we are called to share with the world. The best way to "evangelize" as a UU, is by living our faith and leading by example.
- 6. Our congregation has a beautiful balance of people from the spectrum of socio-economic circumstance. I think this is important for us to be grounded in the reality of Canadian society.

Until now, the cost of the breakfast, about \$90 per week, has been paid out of the Minister's Professional Expenses with some contributions from members through the Minister's Discretionary Fund. I consider it an appropriate use of these funds, seeding a new initiative for our church. But now, with the recent approval or our Board we will be integrating this program into the fabric of the congregation. Beginning in March, one Sunday per month, the money donated to our collection plate, that is not otherwise designate for a pledge etc., will go toward funding our neighbourhood brunch.

Thank you all for your support to date, and if you haven't been out for the Saturday Neighbourhood Brunch you would be most welcome.

Board Buzzz

Something which is on many people's minds is the question of what we are doing about the building. Are we selling and moving? Or are we staying and renovating?

In January the Building Task Force submitted its report to the Board. You may recall that this group zeroed in on exploring four options for the future of our building:

- Occupy space in a new development on the present site that would incorporate neighbouring properties.
- Sell and buy elsewhere.
- Sell and enter into a space-sharing arrangement with another religious community.
- Stay at 5500 Inglis and make it better.

After nearly 18 months of in-depth exploration of all these options, the Task Force has made a final report.

The first option, while complicated, might still have possibilities for the future, but for now, talks with a developer have ended.

The second option is simply not viable in the current market situation.

The third could still work but is unlikely to happen quickly, as any other group involved has deliberate decision-making processes to go through just as we

Therefore the only really viable option at this point in our church life is the last one: to stay where we are and make it better. The last line of the report reads, "With a bit of cash and a dash of imagination, we hope that UUCH can recover even more of the beauty and potential of 5500 Inglis Street."

In accepting this report your Board of Directors began to plan for moving forward.

- First, we go forward with the expectation of being here for at least the next 5 to 10 years.
- Second, we will make a comprehensive plan for improvements to the building, both shortterm and long-term.

My own focus has been on getting the children acclimatized to 'circle time', where we are working on listening to each other and building community. The 'gratitude jars' donated by the congregation and decorated by the children have become a staple of our 'glads and sads' ritual. The Saulnier family are gratitude stars; every evening before dinner the children write what they are grateful for on post-it-note pads. They bring their notes with them on Sundays to share with everyone before storing them in their jars.

Our young adults, Edie, Jane and Lia, have done excellent work with the younger children by sharing the much-needed babysitter role. They are truly indispensable, and I'm delighted that we are able to provide them with early work experience.

THANK YOU to all who have signed up for volunteer positions the last two Sundays during our Volunteer Job Fair. Missed out? Don't fret, openings are still available!

Below, the ideal volunteer jobs, once a month, no meetings, no homework! and crucial in making our Sunday service time enjoyable for all. These operate on a monthly rotation basis. Detailed instructions are available from **Dean White**.

- **Kitchen set-up:** Be the most popular person at church, the coffeemaker. This important role involves starting the coffee about an hour before the service, setting out the hot water urn, mugs, etc.
- **Kitchen clean-up:** Clearing up after the coffee hour, operating the dishwasher, tidying the kitchen.
- Ushers: Working in pairs, early ushers prepare the Worship Room before the service and take up the collection. Late ushers tidy up afterward.
- **Audio operator:** Manages the audio equipment during the service. Training available.

Also monthly, no meetings, no homework ...

- **Library Monitors:** Also on Sundays, during coffee hour. Opens and closes the library, manages book borrowing. Contact **Alison Chipman** for details.
- Updating the Wayside Pulpit: Rev. Norm chooses the quotes for the sign on the church lawn and has them printed in Burnside. On the first day of the month, you pick up the printed signs in Burnside and install them in the Wayside Pulpit. Contact Rev. Norm for more info.
