Minister's Notes



March and Wisdom

Now that I am 70 years old, I want to associate wisdom with age and I am willing to do a little work to make the connection. It occurred to me that wisdom and wizen might have the same root... so that older folks like me could take pride in our "wizenness." Unfortunately, when I checked the etymology of wizen this came up: Old English wisnian, weosnian"to wither, dry up, waste away," from Proto-Germanic *wisnon "to wither," Old High German wesanen "to dry up, shrivel, wither;" German verwesen "to decay, rot". Not at all what I was hoping for.

Well, I still want to believe in a connection between wisdom and age and definitions of wisdom generally include the idea of good judgement which I think is related to experience which in turn comes with age.

I now have 8 years of experience as your minister and I think I have gained some wisdom over that time. I am quite sure that if nothing else, I have gained wisdom about my own limitations and foibles. I thank the congregation for helping me in that regard.

So, all of this accumulated wisdom is at your service. We are now two and a half months away from hosting the Canadian Unitarian Council

Conference here in Halifax, and I am pumped. I am hoping that we will take full advantage of this event to raise the profile of our faith tradition in Halifax. We are in the process of engaging a media consultant to help us in this regard.

We have spent much time and energy over the years talking about what we can do to attract more people to our spiritual community. I think that the right formula has three main components.

First, do good things: Things like: excellent Sunday services... like helping refugees to locate in Canada... like serving a weekly meal to our neighbours... like our new Soulful Sundown Service the last Sunday of the month, focussed on music and poetry... like our coffeehouse... like our Blue Christmas service... like our support for Pride... etc.

Second, make people in the community aware of what we are doing. As part of the planning for hosting the CUC conference we have received a grant from the West Trust and matching funds from a generous donor, to among other things, hire a media consultant to help us to build "getting the word out" into everything we do.

Third, make sure that we are the welcoming, tolerant, non-judgemental and friendly congregation that we profess to be. If we do the first two steps well, we will attract people into our congregation. They will come back only if they feel truly welcome.

So there is a simple three-step program based on my accumulated experience and wisdom. What do you think?

Board Buzz

The UUCH Board of Trustees met on February 12 and opened the meeting with Troy Saulnier in the Chair.

There followed a brief roundtable discussion of **Governance and Ministry** touching on the topics of Board Committees and the numerical composition of the Board. In light of this, a review of the by-laws and possible amendments is to be carried out.

A variety of reports were received and accepted from, respectively, Rev. Norm Horofker; Jessica Friesen, Director of Music; Marie-Claude Leroux, Director of Religious Exploration and Marilyn Shinyei, Treasurer.

In light of the **departure of Sandra Jamieson**, Office Administrator at the end of the month, various aspects of office management were discussed including voice mail, rentals and bookkeeping. A Board potluck in Sandra's honour was to be held at Rev. Norm's home on 15th February and a celebration of Sandra's tenure with the church was planned for 16 February following the Sunday service.

The **CUC Conference and AGM** to be held in Halifax in May, 2020, is well along in its planning and various aspects of the event were approved.

In terms of **property matters**, the Board considered the structural assessment of the church and the Municipal Heritage Registration.

Also discussed was the need for a **defibrillator** made available in the church.

In terms of **Refugee support** it was reported that a new sponsorship of a Rwandan family will be considered this year, for which a Go-Fund-Me campaign will begin as soon as possible.

Under new business, two items for the next meeting include holding a **Racism workshop** in the near future—and a consideration by the Board of an **internship appointment** in the new year.

Input to the board on these matters or any others noted above is encouraged.

"MAKING WAVES" Conference in Halifax—Two Months Away and Counting!!!



Making Waves is just two months away and the activity level has gone up several notches as the event gets close. It will be here before we know it.

What a wonderful time it will be for us all, to be hosting committed UUs from across Canada and to be experiencing a National Conference ourselves!

We now know many more details of the conference. The CUC has just published the conference website with information on registration, workshops, costs, accommodation, forms for youth and adults, etc. You can access it at:

The conference schedule is on the website, with details on major events such as the **Confluence** Lecture on Friday evening, the Annual Meeting on Friday afternoon, etc.

CUC has lined up six choices for the Saturday morning and afternoon workshop streams—and eight choices for the Multigenerational workshops on Sunday afternoon. In the Networking Sessions late Sunday afternoon there will be two UUCH offerings: Rev. Norm's Ukulele Workshop and a session on Refugees led by Andy Blair and Marilyn Shinyei. It is well worth spending time on the conference website to plan how best to use your time at the conference.

The UUCH Host Committee is responsible for the weekend music, social events like the Saturday evening party, and the Sunday morning worship service. A large team is meeting regularly to plan the music, which will involve Vanessa Lindsay-Botten's "open to all" choir, musicians and a contra dance caller for the Saturday night ceilidh, and of course the UUCH Afterchoir and the ukulele workshop and the traditional Sunday evening singalong. The goal is to have music at every social

event during the weekend. One highlight will be the theme song composed by John Lindsay-Botten which will be introduced on Friday evening and sung throughout the weekend. It is going to be a memorable weekend of music! The Sunday worship service will include some special Maritime touches such as the presence of Mi'kmag elders.

CUC is trying some new payment approaches this year, using a sliding scale where people choose what they can afford to pay, and eliminating the early bird registration discount. Details are on the registration form on the CUC website.

Also, there are options for people who are not registering for the whole conference to buy tickets to specific social events like the Saturday night dinner and ceilidh or the Sunday night closing banquet. And of course the Sunday morning worship service is free and open to all. People who don't feel up to attending the workshops or who have work or family commitments on Saturday or Sunday can still participate in a lot of the fun of the conference. LET'S MAKE IT A GOAL for every member of the UUCH community to get to at least one conference event.

The Host Committee has established a fund to subsidize UUCH people of limited means who want to attend all or part of the conference, and also has some discounted registrations available if people are able to volunteer. If you would like some financial help, please speak confidentially to Darla Muzzerall, Host Committee treasurer. And, if you can donate to the fund to help others in UUCH attend the conference, please let Darla know. CUC also has some subsidy funds available for adult and participants. The requirements vouth application forms for these are on the conference website. Deadline for applying is March 15.

CUC has appointed the leaders for the Chorus Youth program for ages 18-35 and the CanUUdle program for ages 14-19, and will soon appoint someone to lead the Children's program for ages up through 13, working with Marie-Claude. Lots more volunteers are needed to work with the Children's program and CanUUdle. A separate article in this newsletter

lists all the required Host Committee functions and open positions. Please look at it and decide where you can help. *Remember, volunteers have more fun!*

The attractive, eyecatching cotton T-shirt that Molly has designed in vibrant ocean colours will soon be available for purchase at a very reasonable price. We are hoping that UUCH people will buy a T-shirt and wear it around town to help publicize the conference. Watch for a table to be set up to sell T-shirts during Sunday morning coffee hour.

We need more volunteers to provide homestay accommodation for out-of-town attendees.

Requests for homestays will be coming in soon, with the registration forms. This involves providing a bed but NOT transportation and meals, as these are the attendee's responsibility. If you might be able to offer a homestay, please let Elinor Egar-Reynolds know. See Elinor's piece on this topic elsewhere in this newsletter. We hope you will be inspired to extend this welcoming gesture. Elinor will need to start making assignments. Your offer could well be crucial to that one last person needing a home stay.

To encourage people to attend *Making Waves*, the Communications team prepared a promotional piece on Maritime music which went to the 3000 names on the CUC email list in early February. You can see the piece on the CUC website. The third of our promotional pieces emphasizes the warmth of a Maritime welcome and the great time we are planning for attendees; this will be published by CUC in early March, as well as going on their website. We will also send it directly to Canadian congregations. After this we will concentrate on local promotion.

SUBSIDIES AVAILABLE TO HELP WITH MAKING WAVES REGISTRATION COSTS!

There are two sources of subsidies for those needing financial help with the costs of attending Making Waves. One is the UUCH subsidy fund; the second is the CUC subsidy program. Information on both is below. The deadline for applying for a CUC subsidy is March 15, but a UUCH subsidy can be requested at any time.

First, **the UUCH Subsidy Fund:** In the January newsletter we launched an appeal for funds to enable subsidies for people in the UUCH community who would like to attend part or all of Making Waves, but who cannot afford the cost of \$300-plus for registration.

So far we have close to a thousand dollars in the fund—a great start. If anyone can contribute to this fund it would be much appreciated. Darla Muzzerall (the Host Committee treasurer) will administer the fund confidentially, and tax receipts will of course be issued. A BIG THANK YOU to those who have already donated to help others.

Anyone wishing to attend Making Waves, or some of the social activities associated with it, but cannot afford it, is asked to speak confidentially with Darla so that a subsidy can be arranged. Please do this now, so that we know how much money will be needed.

Thank you, everyone, for any help that you can provide to make sure that everyone in our community can share this major event for UUCH.

The CUC also has funds available to subsidize costs for people who wish to attend CUC events such as Making Waves. The deadline for submitting an online application for a CUC subsidy for Making Waves is March 15.

For adults, there is the Edward Bevan Ratcliffe Leadership Fund. This subsidy helps leaders to attend regional, national, and continental conferences, and leadership development opportunities. Leaders who may apply for this financial support include religious educators, congregational board members, youth advisors, lay chaplains, and

ministers, as well as lay people of all ages who serve their congregations in other volunteer or paid capacities.

The Dawning Future Subsidy provides financial assistance to Unitarian Universalist youth (13-19), young adults (18-35) and youth advisors to help them attend regional, national and continental conferences and faith development events. Applicants must be a youth (13-19) or a young adult (18-35) who is active in a congregation or regional, national, or continental UU community. In addition, youth advisors of any age may apply for a subsidy to attend youth events or youth advisor trainings, but priority will be given to those who are young adults.

Again, the application deadline for a CUC subsidy is March 15. If you believe that you meet the criteria, we hope that you will submit an application.

There are also some discounts available for people who volunteer at Making Waves. Look elsewhere in this newsletter for the latest list of open volunteer spots. And, if you are able to donate to the UUCH subsidy fund to help get us all to the event, please let Darla know.

Religious Exploration

The RE program has had another engaging month, thanks to the participation of the many who come forth and connect with our children and youth.

The children have continued with the Tapestry of Faith program "Love Surrounds Us". This program aims to teach participants the Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism through the lens of the love that surrounds us at home and in our communities. Since the fall, we have learned about the first, second and third principles with the overall themes of acceptance, kindness, and each person's unique gifts. Thank you to Troy Saulnier for taking the helm while I was away, in leading the children's program and teaching them about the flower communion ritual.

The youth have continued with the Tapestry of Faith program "Amazing Grace" through the able guidance of Janet Horofker and Pam Berman. The focus in February was the role of forgiveness in their lives—what it means, what it can bring for one's self and others. As part of their community service project, Pam Griffin-Hody led the youth in a lively discussion about the impacts of bullying. They created designs about anti-bullying and treating others with kindness and solidarity onto tshirts for Pink Shirt Day. Started in Nova Scotia by high school youth, this campaign has become international. It's encouraging to see youth stand up for the importance of treating each other with dignity and compassion.





For February's Spirit Art session, Scott Wood gave the RE program a most interesting presentation about the idea and importance of communication, and how it relates to his nearly lifelong hobby of being an amateur radio operator. The children and youth learned and practiced Morse code—and were duly impressed at Scott's "fluency"; he easily sent out our names in Morse code, without a second's thought!

The church and RE program also received the beautiful gift of the completed quilt that Marilyn Shinyei put together with the squares designed by the children and youth. Marilyn generously spent considerable time in putting the squares together into a colorful, stunning design that she assembled, layered and quilted to be enjoyed by all. Thank you, Marilyn!
