Minister's Notes



Thresholds

John Shaar wrote "The future is not some place we are going, but one we are creating. The paths are not to be found but made. And the activity of making them changes both the maker and the destination."

We are standing on the threshold of a new world: post COVID-19. We cannot go back. The landscape ahead may at first look impenetrable... lots of stagnant swamps, thick forests and rugged mountains.

We don't have any control over the landscape, but we can choose our path, and in so doing change ourselves and our destination.

In the past month we faced a seemingly impossible chasm that kept us from meeting in our sanctuary. And we have blazed a new trail that has taken us into the new world of online Sunday services. With the help of a great team, we are learning new ways of being together. We are reaching out to people who might never have crossed the threshold of our church. In the process we are being changed, and what our church looks like will no doubt be changed for the better.

We have chosen to reach out to other UU ministers across the country, welcoming them into our Sunday services and strengthening our relationships. And on Sunday May 17 Halifax will be the anchor congregation for the very first live cross-Canada Sunday service for UUs from coast to coast. A new path indeed.

We have found a way around the obstacles of social distancing so that we can keep our relationship with our neighbours who meet at our church every Saturday for a communal breakfast. We cannot sit down together for the time being, but we can provide a hearty take-out lunch and spend some time talking one-on-one with each guest as they come to our door. This is possible due to the efforts

of trail blazers who make and pack the ingredients for the take-out lunch.

And how do we support our young families and children in this new land? Marie-Claude, our Director of Religious Exploration, has set up a time with our younger children and another time for the older youth to meet online. We have new flexibility to meet at times other than Sunday morning and we can gather without the hassle of trekking into church with all the complications that entails for parents and children.

Our new path has taken us into the homes of local musicians who otherwise would be without an outlet for their creativity on a Sunday morning. Jessica, our Music Director, has reached out to friends and acquaintances in her circle to bring new voices into our virtual sanctuary.

All of this in only a month! Our future is not defined by the difficult landscape ahead. The challenges can be invigorating and meaningful, and we, along with our church will be changed in the process.

Now we stand on the threshold of spring. I took this picture in front of the church after the snowstorm of



April 28. The bulbs that Karen Woolhouse and David Lewis donated and planted with the help of Sabine Morris are pushing their way into this new world.

The landscape has changed from when they were planted, but the joy of the natural world still lifts our hearts.

May the path you choose lead you safely through the difficult terrain ahead, may it take you at least for some time into places of tranquility where you can rest, before you must ford the next rushing stream, or spend time in the desert. No doubt you will be changed as you change the world around you.

If anyone is feeling particularly troubled or just needs a non-anxious person to listen, I am available. Please lean on your minister if that will help. I love my role as minister and will be there for you as best I can.

Board Buzz



Life seems to have moved online, and so has the Board. We held our second meeting on Zoom on April 8th—seems like months ago! With the Making Waves conference definitely postponed until 2021 we were able to concentrate on more local UUCH issues.

One of our first topics was a discussion of the book on church governance that we have been reading over the year—Governance and Ministry, Second Edition, by Dan Hotchkiss. We have decided that the Board needs to spend more meeting time on discussion and planning, whenever possible. By circulating staff and committee reports well before the meeting we can have more time for strategic topics when we are together.

At our April meeting we talked about how congregations are generally categorized by size and the differences. The most relevant to our congregation are the family size, (small, up to 100 people attending on a Sunday), and pastoral (medium, 100–250), and the "plateau" area inbetween. So what are the differences in management and influences? Our by-laws clearly outline a family-size church—is this who we are? Should we be aiming for growth or staying in our comfort zone? What changes would have to occur, and do we want them? What is the role of the Board in these decisions? It will be an ongoing discussion.

The various staff and committee reports reveal the world a month ago, when we were just starting to move online. The plans for Sunday services and activities for children and youth were getting underway, and the Caring Committee was setting up the phone contact process for the congregation.

UUCH AGM Postponed

According to our by-laws we need to hold our Annual General Meeting in May of each year. Traditionally we have had it on the last Sunday of that month. However, because of the restrictions on gathering size due to the COVID-19 pandemic we cannot hold our usual in-person meeting at this time.

The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has issued a directive to all organizations whose laws require that they hold their Annual General Meetings now, to allow them to hold virtual meetings, but with specific requirements to ensure equal access for all participants, this would be very difficult for some of our members.

The alternative allowed in the directive is for deferral of general meetings until up to 90 calendar days after the end of the Nova Scotia State of Emergency, when larger, in-person gatherings will again be permitted. The Board has determined that this is our best option.

In conclusion, we do not expect to be having an Annual General Meeting on May 31st. The State of Emergency is currently due to expire May 3rd, but is being extended two weeks at a time. We plan to hold our AGM at a point in the future when it is legal to do so, and we all feel comfortable about gathering together. We will ensure you have at least two weeks notice, the minimum required by our bylaws.
