November 12 – Meaning Making in Liminal Times: In this polarized world... can we just talk?



Saturday, November 25th On Zoom

Working Well Together: Congregational Workshops for Resilience & Renewal

Part 1: 1:30 pm AT (90 minutes + one hour break) Part 2: 4 pm AT (90 minutes + 30 minutes break) Part 3: 6 pm AT (90 minutes)

Focusing on how the larger cultural tensions of our time impact our UU communities and congregations, these 3 workshops include ways to prepare and respond thoughtfully and with intention, along with opportunities to share your concerns, ideas, and initiatives. And don't worry – it's not all work! There will be nurturing and nourishing space as well.

Session 1: Locating Ourselves in a Changing Culture

We'll begin by identifying global and local themes that impact our congregations and communities. Focussing on right relations and covenantal practices, this conversation will identify concerns and possible responses. Resources for proactive options will be shared.

Session 2: Building Relationships Toward a Common Good

Sometimes we feel like we are alone in our justice efforts. In this session we'll think about partnerships to build mutual support, safety, and intentionality into our work. Resources for safety and preparedness will be shared.

Session 3: Practices for Resilience & Renewal

We're doing big and important and difficult work together. Part 3 will share practices, resources, and tools for sustaining our collective well-being, including a shared ritual for all who are gathered.

From the Climate Crisis Team

International dialogue heats up

After Halloween November may seem to be a dull month, but crucial conversations on our climate emergency are picking up speed. The widespread and devastating crises of 2023 (floods, wild fires and hurricanes) have raised the urgency for government and business leaders to take decisive action.

COP 28, the United Nations' Climate Conference will take place in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) from 30 November to 12 December. For a good explanation of the issues read more <u>here.</u>

A split agenda?

UAE has appointed the head of its state oil company, Sultan Al Jaber, to act as President of the talks. It is one of the 10 largest oil producing countries in the world, producing 2.7 million barrels of oil per day in 2021 and Mr. Al Jaber aims to double this by 2027. The world needs less fossil fuel production, not more.

However, he is also the chairman of Masdar, a renewable energy firm now active in over 40 countries. Launched in 2006, it has invested in mainly solar and wind power projects with a total capacity of 15 gigawatts, capable of displacing more than 19 million tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions annually.

3 December is designated as the first COP Health Day, when leaders will be reminded that the climate crisis is already a health crisis. A recent international conference has prepared for this day. More <u>here</u>.

In other news

September's high temperature record was "absolutely, gobsmackingly bananas," said Zeke Hausfather, of the Berkeley Earth climate data project. 45 leading climate scientists were the most shocked by the "off-the-charts sea temperatures and Antarctic ice loss." "These exceptional events could be normal in just a decade, unless there is a dramatic increase in climate action," they said. Source: The Guardian (U.K.)

Norway's EV milestone

Why I Belong

When did you become a UU? I attended my first



service half a century ago, but did not 'become' a UU for about ten years after that because I felt I would be renouncing the religion I grew up in (Hinduism) and becoming a Christian.

What attracted you to this

community? In my early years in Halifax I lived nearby on Lucknow Street, and saw the UU sign. So I went in to take a look. We had a lay leader named John McVittie then. The worship room was about half its current size and faced south. I found the people friendly and congenial, and so I have stayed with UU ever since. What has kept you here? The sense of belonging to a community of friendly and congenial people. About half of my social friends are members of this community. Services I particularly remember were given by outside people, such as David Maginley who works with dying people at the VG; Keith Graham, an architect of churches; a Neptune Theatre director; and a very recent service by Mary-Frances Lynch and Joe Britto, which was about making friends with trees. I like Jessica's musical talents, music by the Afterchoir and enjoy the Coffee House. We used to have Extended Families, Dinners for Eight and an annual retreat at Tatamagouche; I miss these things.

Tell us something about yourself that most people may not be aware of. I was once on the Cohn Auditorium stage as an actor in "The Skin of our Teeth". The size of my role is indicated by the title. And, I have published research on why humans have a brain hemisphere that specializes in language.

In June I opened this report with these words: "The state of the world seems particularly grim these days...". I don't think there has been any improvement, but we continue to soldier on, applying for refugees and welcoming new arrivals.

Sadly, as I write, we still do not have an arrival date for our Rwandan Unitarians, Clement and Sylvie. However, they have got to be here within weeks now. [Oh, this just in! After spending one night in Toronto they will arrive here on November 10th!]



By the end of October, we expect to have received about 140 newcomers, a big jump from the 53 reported at the end of May. It has become very busy. Pictured here are just just two of those arrivals.
