Minister's Notes

Our Theme this month: Belonging

We are born with a need to belong. We are social creatures, too weak to survive on our own, who sometimes get caught up in the illusion that we can take care of ourselves. We need each other for simple things like food and shelter, but we need each other even more for a sense of well being and peace.

As I look out at the congregation on Sundays I see many people who have been members and friends of the congregation for decades. They know in their bones that they belong. They build that sense of belonging a little bit every Sunday, greeting friends and renewing their commitment. For those who have it, it is a blessing.

And I see others who are new to the congregation. They are still trying to figure our who we are, and who they are in relation to this congregation. There is tentativeness and uncertainty in their sense of belonging.

During the social time after the service I can observe new ties being made as long-time members of the congregation reach out to those who are newer. And over weeks and months people gradually make the transition from outsider to insider.

That transition is not easy in a small close knit "family sized congregation" like ours. And sometimes it never happens. I hope that each of you reading this, regardless of where you are on the continuum of belonging, see your responsibility to offer and promote a sense of belonging for all who cross our threshold, and to find your own way into the life of the congregation and the blessings that it brings.

I close with these words adapted from the writing of Rev. Gretchen Haley.

In a world that feeds on moral outrage We are here to cultivate moral courage In a time that prizes, picking sides We gather to draw a wider circle And in a culture that teaches us to get for what we give And to ask "what's in it for me?" We come to practice generosity and to remember, We are all in this together. In the midst of life's bitterness, we choose to sing, to give thanks, to laugh together, and to be keepers of beauty to offer a place of belonging for all who come in gladness and in pain to resist the push to the next moment, and the next to slow down, to breathe more deeply, to feel a part of something greater to belong here in the Universalist Unitarian Church of Halifax

In October we will welcome three newcomers to this fair land. A young man from Uganda arrives Oct 2nd; Nawras's fiancee Nairouz Hamchou lands on the 3rd, and a



Ugandan woman arrives on the 24th.

In the meantime we have been busy submitting applications for more individuals and families including a number of Rainbow Refugees (LGBTQ) and four from the BVOR stream. In total in 2019 we have now submitted applications for 34 people and plan to submit another 25.

We are still anxiously hoping for the arrival of the eight family members going to Mahone Bay, as well as a family of four to Halifax before 2019 is over.

We note that considerable downsizing is going on these days in our church members' households and several people have asked about donating furniture and household goods to this cause. Please do think of us if you have furniture, small appliances, linens, etc. that you are giving away. We are connected with several settlement groups who can use these things as they are welcoming newcomers all the time.

We've made it through the storm and have come together again to resume the Religious Exploration program with the children and youth.



UUs Strike for Climate

Worldwide, it was the largest climate change demonstration ever seen. Local UUs across Canada rallied to show support for the youth-led *Global Climate Strike*, and Halifax was no exception. About a dozen UUs and friends made signs then carried them amongst the throngs of marchers, many of us wearing our yellow 'On the Side of Love' T-shirts.

Halifax Regional Police estimate about 10,000 people marched from Victoria Park down Spring Garden and on the Nova Scotia Power headquarters. The march began at 11 am and continued for a couple of hours before finishing up with speakers at the Grand Parade. This was the largest climate protest in Halifax history.

Protestors of all ages came out for the cause, but the march was organized and led by youth. Students were out in large droves and spoke passionately about the environment and the need for change, inspired by 16-year old Swedish activist Greta Thunberg who herself marched with 500,000 in Montreal. Halifax's climate strike was one of at least eight in Nova Scotia, including rallies in Truro, Middleton, New Glasgow, Antigonish, Sandy Cove, Baddeck and Sydney.

With the latest dire IPCC Report ("*The Oceans & Cryosphere in a Changing Climate*"), elections approaching in many countries, and crucial UN talks this season, climate actions will continue this autumn. The next rally will be on October 7—stay tuned.

About the IPCC

The **Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change** is the United Nations body for assessing the science related to climate change.

The IPCC provides regular assessments of the scientific basis of climate change, its impacts and future risks, and options for adaptation and mitigation.

Created in 1988 by the World Meteorological Organization (WMO) and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), the objective of the IPCC is to provide governments at all levels with scientific information that they can use to develop climate policies. IPCC reports are also a key input into international climate change negotiations.

The IPCC is an organization of governments that are members of the United Nations or WMO. The IPCC currently has 195 members. Thousands of people from all over the world contribute to the work of the IPCC. For the assessment reports, IPCC scientists volunteer their time to assess the thousands of scientific papers published each year to provide a comprehensive summary of what is known about the drivers of climate change, its impacts and future risks, and how adaptation and mitigation can reduce those risks.
