Minister's Notes



On September's Theme: Embracing Possibility

I begin by admitting a desire to procrastinate rather than write these notes... I am not ready to give up on summer just yet!

Given the continuing pandemic, it has been a good summer for Janet and me. We spent a week in Toronto with our eldest daughter, her husband and our 16-month-old granddaughter Beatrix, followed by a week in Milwaukee with our other daughter, her husband and our 11-month-old granddaughter Millie. We are blessed indeed.

I don't feel any need to justify speaking of my grandchildren, but if I did, our theme for September – Embracing Possibility – would be the perfect excuse. Watching a child learn to grow, to crawl, to walk and talk, to trust and to love, is an overwhelming spiritual experience that speaks to our theme this month.

Two years ago, few of us were considering the possibility of a pandemic, but when it struck, we had little choice but to embrace new possibilities good and bad... all challenging.

So here we are at the beginning of a new year. Not only have we survived, but we have flourished thanks to your support and to the leadership of our Board of Directors. And we begin a new church year with the leadership of Troy Saulnier and Pam Griffin-Hody and a solid team.

We have learned how to do Sunday services in a format the allows people to attend in person, or to join via the internet. We have embraced the possibility of a church without walls.

We have the best staff that we have ever had. Marie-Claude, our Director of Religious Exploration, never missed a beat during the pandemic, alternating between online services and outdoor field trips for our children and young families. Jessica, our Music Director, adapted to online services and the technology, becoming the person responsible for set-up before services and then taking over the services for the entire summer. We adapted services from across Canada giving everyone a chance to hear from UU ministers from several different congregation.

Stephen Butler has kept the building and grounds in shape and I know he is anxious to have more people back using the building.

Although not paid staff, John Piccolo and Paul Galbraith have been essential volunteers. None of our online services would have been possible without their technical support. I am in regular contact with several ministerial colleagues, and they are in awe of what our volunteers have been able to do.

We completed a 10-month online religious exploration program for adults called UU Wellspring "Sources". All eight participants are enthusiastic to see us continue the program. Watch for your opportunity to participate with announcements forthcoming soon.

We have ten active teams meeting each month dealing with a wide variety of topics related to the mission of our congregation. Have a look at the schedule posted elsewhere in this newsletter for details, and consider joining one or more of these teams. These teams offer an opportunity to learn, to socialize and to make meaningful contributions to our mission.

We are a small community, with an important message for our time... a time of spiritual problems and possibilities: housing, income disparity, racialization, mental health, drug abuse, climate change and more. We are a community of some 90 adult members in a city of 400,000 people. As your minister, going into my 10th year of service, I feel more confident in my abilities than ever.

In this year ahead, I commit to embracing the possibilities contained in our faith tradition. I hope you will join with the Board, the staff and your minister to do the same.

Code Red for Humanity

In case you missed it, a new Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report was published on 9 August. It gives the strongest warning yet, that unless we take immediate action, climate warming will soon become unstoppable. Human life will become untenable. Summer sizzle

We are all aware of the summer heat wave out West, resulting in record forest fires and drought. Other countries are also experiencing major shifts in climate, e.g., frightening fires in Greece and Turkey and devastating floods in Europe.

Look North

It rained recently, for the first time ever, above the Greenland ice sheet which is melting faster than ever; the Labrador sea ice was too thin to travel on this past winter; the Arctic Ocean is forecast to be ice-free in summer by 2035. All of these events illustrate exactly what the climate scientists are telling us: the climate is heating rapidly and time is running out.

Provincial Election

A public opinion poll showed that the environment was the second most urgent election issue for Nova Scotians. However, none of the three major parties named it as a top priority! My conclusion: our political leaders continue to demonstrate a uniform deafness to the urgency of the climate meltdown. This is despite decades of scientific data showing that we are very close to losing any chance of preventing runaway climate heating.

How will we respond? Here are both individual and communal ideas:

- Monday 20 September Federal election. Please keep the climate crisis top of mind before voting and encourage your friends to do likewise.
- Global "Fridays for Future" rallies, led by school students, have not been possible in Nova Scotia due to COVID 19 restrictions. However, the last one saw 10,000 participate in Halifax. The next scheduled rally is on 24 September if gathering restrictions allow. Anyone can attend as a supporter. Will UUCH be there in numbers?
- Workshop, Sunday, 26 September, following the service, Carl Duivenvoorden will be our guest speaker on Zoom. Here is a father who has made "green" commitments to his young son. Preview his ideas <u>here</u>

CUC eNews, August 24 Forums on Dismantling Racism and the 8th Principle Process



Over the summer and into the fall of 2021, roundtable discussions and forums provide spaces for UUs to reflect on and ask questions of ourselves about what it means to "accountably dismantle racism in ourselves and our institutions."

Some are hesitant to adopt this 8th Principle, stating that the existing Seven Principles include and imply actions for dismantling racism and other oppressions. Others are concerned about the process, and some have issues with the wording and that it may not be complete or accurate. Others are worried that it commits us to accountability when the other principles don't have similar 'accountable' phrasing, and that there is no offered definition for 'being accountable.' Still, others are enthusiastic about a principle on dismantling racism that is regarded as long overdue and desperately needed.

Four forums this fall are designed to guide us through a process of reflection on our visceral responses to dismantling racism and the proposed 8th Principle, with the goal of preparing us for the Special Meeting. Using the chalice as a symbol, each of the four sessions poses questions that urge us to examine some (challenging) realities within ourselves and our UU communities and the work ahead.

Who should attend the forums? Board members, leaders, youth, young adults, ministers, religious educators, those who are invested in the outcome, those who want to do the work of dismantling racism, delegates to the Special Meeting on November 27, those who have uncertainties.

Forums are on Sundays, September 19 and October 3 and 17, at 8 pm AT.

Roundtable conversations complement the forums and are held on the last Saturday of each month. These are opportunities to ask questions, express concerns, state affirmations, and have respectful dialogue with each other.

Roundtables are on Saturdays, August 28, September 25, and October 30, at 1:00 pm AT.

Still hoping to get busy this fall with arrivals. There are 171 people for whom we applied in 2018, 2019, and 2020 who are yet to arrive!

From Margaret Galbraith

When did you become a UU? We "found" the Unitarian Fellowship of Fredericton in 1980, and then joined UUCH in December 1981. Our children were small, we were looking for a church to join as we had both



grown up in a church community and considered it important for their education. We checked out Anglican and United churches in Fredericton, where we lived at the time, but then found the small community of UUs there much more to our liking. We joined UUCH shortly after moving to the Halifax area in 1981.

What attracted you to this community?

We were both disenchanted with the Christian dogma that we grew up with. The diverse community of UUCH felt much more comfortable. The Unitarian principles, the sermons, the discussions, the UU World articles, the friendly questioning community – all seemed to fit.

What has kept you here?

Social action with a like-minded group has drawn me back, about 15 years ago. Our children did not enjoy the RE program when we joined in the 80s, and I became very busy on weekends with my Girl Guide volunteer work, so we were not active for about 20 years.

Tell us something about yourself that you don't think most people are aware of?

Years before we attended a Unitarian service we were married by an American Unitarian minister. Because I didn't believe in Anglican liturgy, my family's Anglican minister in St.Catharines would not marry us, so I found a Unitarian minister from Niagara Falls, NY, since there were no available Unitarian ministers anywhere between Niagara and Toronto at the time, January 1969!
