Minister's Note Expanding Circles of Trust

I'm in a peer group with three other ministers. Our monthly gatherings have two main parts: A check-in about how we are doing (body, mind and soul), and then a time for each of us to reflect on an issue we are addressing or a choice we have to make in the congregation we serve.

I experience these gatherings as grounding, connecting, opening, reflective, adventurous.

We begin our sessions by reading aloud a Quaker document called the *Touchstones for Co-Creating Trustworthy Spaces* (from Parker Palmer's Center for Courage and Renewal). The touchstones are guidelines for how we want to be together. Some of them are "Extend and receive welcome... Speak your truth in ways that respect other people's truth... When the going gets rough, turn to wonder... No fixing, no saving, no advising, no correcting each other... Attend to your own inner teacher... Treat silence as a member of the group..."

These are similar to guidelines often used in UU small groups (perhaps with more emphasis on the Quaker practices of silence and listening to the voice within). The document takes a few minutes to read aloud, and every month we ask "Do we really need to read it again?" It's written on our hearts, but yes, we decide every month, we want to say the words again. We like who we are when we fully drop into these touchstones.

During election season, or during an economic crisis, it can be tempting to choose other ways of being. Urgency, with much on the line, might tempt you towards speaking your perspective with the expectation that others agree (and condemning those who don't). You might see silence as an opportunity to repeat your talking points. When the going gets rough you might turn to righteous indignation. There are activist schools that teach these behaviours.

I don't think these behaviours work. They can succeed at cohering an in-group, but at the cost of pushing away an out-group (and eventually the in-group turns on itself).

In these times, every interaction is an opportunity to bring your worldview to life – conveying kindness, respect, mutuality, right of conscience, and more.

If you'd like to try out a Circle of Trust, let me know (minister@uuch.ca). You might especially like it if you tend to keep a protective wall up around others, if others tend to keep a protective wall up around you, or if you're curious what your inner teacher has to say.

The world I imagine can only come into being if there is a high level of trust in society. I believe that this can best happen by creating and expanding circles of trust.

Your Climate Vote

This coming election arrives at a time of upheaval and tension on so many fronts; there are multiple issues on Canadians' minds. You may not think that climate change is as important as many of these other issues, but Canada's carbon emissions are still dangerously high. The emissions of today that will stay in our atmosphere for many years to come will lead to worsening climate disasters world-wide.

Today we need leaders who see further ahead than the next election, leaders who are willing to tackle the climate issues. When their candidates come to your door during this campaign here are some questions to pose:

1. How will your party reduce Canada's carbon emissions?

Background. With the removal of the consumer carbon price, how will carbon emissions be reduced in the future? What will replace those reductions?

2. Will your party fast-track improvements to National Building Codes to require increased energy-efficiency?

Background. Legislative changes to building codes take too long to implement, when energy-savings are needed urgently. More here Canadian Underwriter.

3. Will your party continue to provide financial incentives for Canadians to improve their own energy efficiency by renovating their homes and purchasing electric vehicles?

Background. To date, these funding programmes have been very popular with Canadians and quickly used up allocated funding. They should be expanded.

4. Will your party support the establishment of a Youth Climate Corps in Canada, with long-term funding?

Background. Many young adults are highly motivated to make a difference to the climate of their future. A Youth Climate Corps already exists in B.C., preparing young adults for green jobs. Why not expand it across the country? More here CBC Radio "What on Earth?" 14 March 2025.

Reconciliation and Dismantling Racism Committee (RDR)

Support Reconciliation + Dismantling Racism and the CBC

The next 4 weeks will determine the fate of the CBC. If you love or value the CBC you are encouraged to pay close attention to the positions of each party on funding for the CBC in the current election and to ask candidates what their position is. Some parties have not yet stated their policy on the CBC so we cannot present them all here.

This issue is of interest to the RDR Committee members because the CBC has several excellent programs on Indigenous and Black issues in Canada and several other programs include interviews on these topics regularly. These shows advance the goals of UUCH by their thoughtful programming. These include:

On CBC Radio/ CBC Listen App:

Unreserved; this is my favourite, a national program hosted by Rosanna Deerchild, who is Cree. She interviews Indigenous cultural and community leaders about a wide variety of topics and events in a friendly, informative, often moving way.

Radio 1: Sun 2-3 pm; Tues 1-2 pm

Reclaimed; explores contemporary Indigenous music, sometimes a bit raucous, but you can also discover real gems.

Radio 1: Mon 3-4 pm; Radio 2: Wed 6-7 pm; Sat 5-6 pm

Local shows feature regular stories on Indigenous and Black issues.

Information Morning hosted by Portia Clark.

Radio 1: M-F 6-8:40 am.

Mainstreet hosted by Jeff Douglas.

Radio 1: M-F 3-6 pm

The CBC News App has a series called "Being Black in Canada".

CBC TV shows on GEM:

North of North, an 8-episode comedy series released in 2025, set in Arctic Canada


Diggstown – 3 seasons set in Halifax, about a Black legal aid lawyer (very good).

The Porter – 1 season, about efforts to create a Black Porters Union in Canada in 1920's. Cancelled by its American media co-producer before the full story could be told.

This election will be pivotal to Canada's future as we face unprecedented aggression. It will determine how closely Canada's next government aligns with UUCH values, including reconciliation and dismantling racism.

Meet a Fellow UU: This Is Mary-Frances

Mary-Frances Lynch, a young Catholic girl from Cornwall Ontario, came to Halifax in 2007 to attend university and she never left. She enrolled in an Environmental Studies program at Dalhousie as a graduate student, and Halifax has been her home ever since.

So, how does a young Catholic woman from Cornwall end up at the Unitarian Church in Halifax. It was a circuitous route. Mary-Frances, as a young student, was exposed to other religions, and began to question her Catholic beliefs. Through her travels in India she explored Buddhism. She had friends who were UUs, and they piqued her interest. She attended a service about 10 years ago, but was still not committed. She also followed the service on Zoom from time to time during the pandemic.

After her son Llewyn was born, 5 years ago, Mary-Frances decided she needed to reconnect with a spiritual community, and wanted her son to experience this as well. She said she needed a "weekly dose of something to think about... what do I believe." So she started attending services at 5500 Inglis. She and her partner have since had a second child, Flannery, now 18 months old.

So, what keeps her here? She found UUCH to be a welcoming community, and has made many friends. The ministers were "interesting and engaging"... and "there's an openness to explore other philosophies, other beliefs"... "questions and curiosity are encouraged". She liked that.

It would seem she found what she was looking for, and officially became a member two years ago. Now she's on the board as a member at large for her second term. She's been on the Climate Crisis Team, and is involved in the weekly service from time to time.

Mary-Frances comes from a family where volunteerism was encouraged. Her father was Mayor of Cornwall at one time, and her mother was a school principal. So volunteering her time and talents at her church was a natural progression for her.

She is a businesswoman as well, having run her own company for almost 10 years. It's called Woven Communications; she is a consultant mostly with the renewable energy sector. She does event planning, writing, research and community engagement projects. As her website says, she "specializes in people and words... weaving connection between the two."

And at the UU church in Halifax, Mary-Frances and her family have woven strong connections. We're all glad she's here.

Endowment Committee Update

As mentioned in the most recent annual report, the UUCH endowment committee has been considering whether to move our endowment fund, currently held at RBC. It's been held in socially responsible funds from the time the endowment was established. (We are thankful to Marilyn, Mary Lu, and Kay!)

The CUC is suggesting, however, that congregations try to get even further away from banks that are heavily involved with fossil fuel industries. Though one congreg-



ation alone will have little effect here, in banding with other UU congregations across the country we can make a bit more of an impact. As a committee, our goal is to examine our options in a responsible, measured way before we make any changes.

Did you know that the Theatre Arts Guild (aka the Pond Playhouse) is presenting a new version of *Little Women* until April 12th? Playwright Kate Hamill's adapted version, that reflects some of the concerns of our present day, promises to be interesting and a pleasure to watch.

Louisa May Alcott, a Unitarian, the original author of *Little Women*, wrote with a more realistic slant than the religious themes that were common in her day. *Little Women* became instantly popular and has endured to this day.

Did you know that Ms. Alcott (in the mid-19th century) was a dedicated advocate of the abolitionist movement? She raised considerable funds in support of anti-slavery activism by presenting plays, some of which were based on Dickensian themes, and gave all proceeds to the cause.
