

The CUC Annual General Meeting will take place on Saturday, May 31, online via Zoom. The CUC Board and staff invites everyone to be part of this annual process.



No new motions beyond the regular business motions have been received for proposal.

Some have already joined in a hosted conversation (on April 9th) to learn about the Gradients of Agreement as a voting mechanism for the AGM (introduced in 2024). Another discussion on this takes place on May 7th, at 8:30 pm Atlantic time, as well as to discuss other matters related to the AGM, to ask questions and share feedback. Register here. Come prepared to participate in a mock vote using your smart device or computer.

In order for your congregation to have a vote at the AGM, you'll need to select delegates. <u>Here's</u> <u>some information</u> about what it involves and how many delegates your congregation is entitled to.

All UUs are welcome to join us for the AGM, not just delegates.

Reports and documents for the AGM will be sent out in early May to congregations and delegates.

It's That Time of Year!

As I write this, the focus is all about Earth Week, and with our own weather finally warming up we can actually enjoy being outside. Spring is really here.

Every year many of us do the same things each spring – clearing up the yard, getting out the bike, going for a longer walk than usual, planning summer flowers. Looking online isn't usually on that list, but there are surprising ideas for great family activities on the Halifax.ca website. Go to the About Halifax section, then Environment & Climate Change.

There is one menu item called Earth Day – still relevant, whenever you read this.

The first section is a list of a series of guided walks, all during Earth Week, and over by the time you get this newsletter. However they give you ideas of places to go. This section features various topics: invasive species, how to identify trees, birds at sunset – which can be engaged in at any time.

There are also very interesting tips for action during Earth Week, or again, anytime: using a rain barrel to collect the excess water running off your roof and down your downspouts; or building a rain garden that will absorb water, controlling erosion, enhancing your property and attracting pollinators; using the Parks & Recreation section of the Halifax.ca website to find parks and trails near you to explore at your leisure; and cleaning up after your pets wherever you go – runoff flows into streams, rivers, lakes and the ocean, carrying pollutants with it.

These activities are described on the Halifax.ca website, but they are possible wherever you live in the province. Every week can be Earth Week – enjoy our planet mindfully.

And plan to join the celebration on June 7th! The People's Parade for Life on Earth, started as part of Earth Week, will be on the first Saturday in June this year. See more details elsewhere in this newsletter.

Refugee Committee News

It has been a very long time since we last updated you about our Refugee Settlement work. There is much to tell. We welcomed 111 newcomers in 2024. There were 11 Afghans, 50 Syrians, 36 Africans (Eritrean, Ethiopian, & Somali), 5 Iranian and 9 Rainbow Refugees from several countries.

It would be nice to tell you that all went well but we always have our challenges and 2024 was no exception — newcomers moving to other provinces, newcomers with mental health issues, family disagreements, relationship breakdowns, and even sponsors failing to fulfill their responsibilities. It's always interesting and we are grateful for our team, their collective wisdom, resources and the help they give us. In fact, two of our newcomers are living with two of our team members due to co-sponsor breakdowns.

And then there are the miracles — like the Afghan family of seven arriving on Christmas Eve after a very long and tumultuous path. We also had two babies born last year — Clement and Sylvie's Aliannah in April, then a Somali baby girl in September. Those newborn girl clothes are really making the circuit as I just delivered them to an Ethiopian mom who is also expecting a girl. Another Unitarian Rwandan family (and friends of Clement & Sylvie) arrived to the Peterborough UU congregation in November; the CUC was their SAH.

Unfortunately, the Canadian government (Immigration, Refugees & Citizenship Canada) threw us some curve balls in late 2024. First, they paused the Groups of Five Stream — not something we do, but an important program for refugees that complements our Private Sponsorship Stream. Next, they announced a reduction in the arrival levels over the next three years. This means the backlog of 100,000 refugees with applications already submitted will have to wait longer and longer. They cut funding by 20% which impacts their own staffing levels and all their funded groups like ISANS here in Halifax. Sponsorship Agreement Holders (that's us) are not funded, BTW. And finally they cut the number of spaces each SAH can have so that means we get 100 this year instead of the 125 requested

Here we are one-third of the way through 2025 and seeing a definite slow-down in arrivals. We have had only 21 arrivals and that should be at least 40. We are still waiting for 227 people we applied for pre-2024. One of those has been waiting since 2019. Here's hoping the rest of the year picks up. Meanwhile, Andrea and I are plugging away at getting the 2025 applications done.
